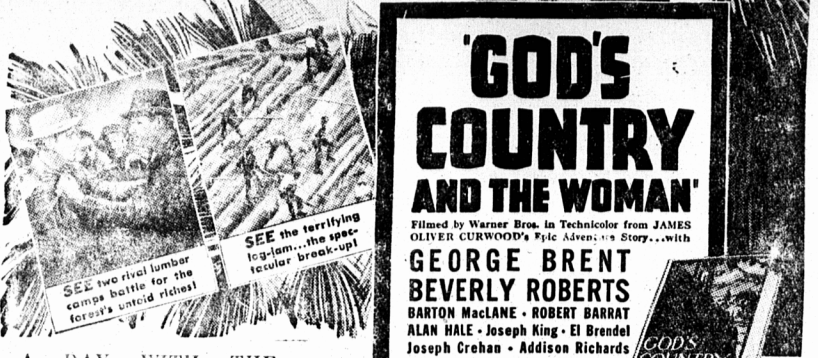

Trooping Color Reflects Glory Of Valiant Men

(By Edwin Johnson) (Canadian Press Staff Writer) LONDON, June 9 - Traditional ceremony of trooping the color enacted June 9 in honor of the King's 41st birthday...

These insignia, from the first, have had a definite moral significance as embodying the spirit of the unit or army that bore them...

The drill laid down for the duties of trooping the color is found in military books dating back to the early 17th century...

Limitation later became general and in 1743 these two colors, the King's color and the Regimental color were made regulation for all military regiments...

According to legend, the slow march to which the officers proceed to their companies at the start of the trooping ceremony...

Accompanied by a retinue of dazzling uniforms, the King rides at the head of the cavalcade from Buckingham Palace, along the Mall to the Horse Guards' Parade...

Directly behind him follow his brothers, the Dukes of Gloucester and Kent, serving as personal aides-de-camp, also by the Earl of Harrowood, husband of the Princess Roya, the Earl of Athlone, Queen Mary's brother and Prince Arthur of Connaught.

As his Majesty reaches the parade ground where the troops are massed in ranks forming a hollow square, bands crash out Royal Salute and the National Anthem.

The King then takes a position at the saluting base as the 2000 Guardsmen, their bayonets flashing, move off in perfect unison to the strains of the massed bands.

Escorted by 100 picked men, a sergeant-major with drawn sword hands the guarded King's color to the "Color Ensign" who marches to the end of the long line and begins the "troop."

Prolonged rolling of drums precede the famous "British Grenadiers," always played when the King's color is trooped, as the officer bears the flag, emazonized with the regment's battle honors, past the entire parade.

Amid the booming of distant cannon and the cheering of the crowd, the King shouts a crisp order and heads the cavalcade on the return procession to the Palace.

Trooping the color is not confined to the Guards. Many regiments troop their color on the anniversaries of great battles in which they have taken part or other special occasions.

Crop Conditions In Western Canada

WINNIPEG, Man., June 9 - Light to moderate showers and thunderstorms occurred at many points in three Western Provinces during the past week have served to continue satisfactory crop growth in all sections outside the drought areas of Southern Saskatchewan and Alberta. In these latter show-

All sections of Manitoba report conditions good with sufficient moisture for the present and no insect or other damage apparent except for a small amount of oats and barley still to go in between Swan River and Dauphin. Wild oats have delayed seeding of some coarse grains between Swan River and Hudson Bay Junction and towards Kelvington. In Southeastern Saskatchewan rain is badly needed around Kipling, Maryfield and Kelo with soil becoming hard and dry. Showers occurred at many points in this area with Estevan receiving approximately one half inch of rain. It was estimated only

40 per cent. of acreage is seeded at that point on account of waiting for rain all points in this area require more rain at once. Crops in Northeastern Saskatchewan continue to make favorable progress with many areas receiving rain since last report. Northern Saskatchewan covered by the Prince Albert division received good rains during the week considerably since precipitation which have changed conditions. From Saskatoon south west five to twelve hours rain on May 28th greatly improved the outlook Kinderley received approximately one and one third inches of rain and conditions are now considered promising.

No grasshopper damage is reported in this area but cutworms have appeared around Kinley. In the Calgary Division of Alberta rains has also occurred and conditions are improving some grasshopper damage is reported but all points are distributing poison bait and the situation is considered in control at present. More moisture is needed between Warden and Tallow on the Sheerness Division. High winds in the past forty eight hours swept Alberta from Edmonton to Lloydminster, south with some damage from drifting at a number of points. Similar winds extended east to Saskatoon with estimated damage not yet reported. The majority of points in North Eastern Alberta show conditions from good to excellent. A good rain would be beneficial around White Court on the Sanguid Subdivision.

Crops are generally in a favorable condition in the Peace River but rain will be required practically throughout this area before long if this is to continue. Wheat is up about four inches and seeding is completed except for low lying spots.

Speech Guarded As "S S" Police Back Nazi Rule

BERLIN, June 8.-(AP) -The Gestapo "must be kept informed about everything that happens in the Reich and must keep known enemies of the regime under constant observation." Thus speaks Heinrich Himmler, 36, chief of the Nazi "SS" (Schutz Staffel, black-shirted Hitler guards) and head of the German secret state police.

"Just like the army," says Herr Himmler, "the secret police can accomplish its tasks only in obedience to orders from its leaders and not by living up to fixed laws."

It did not calm antagonists' nerves when Himmler, in an inter-

view with the German publicist, Dr. Otto Krieger, announced that the gates of concentration camps "never will swing open again" for many prisoners.

The name "Gestapo" is a contraction of the proper title of the organization, "Geheime Staats-Polizei" (secret state police). Its operatives, their number a secret, are believed to be everywhere. For example: There was a dinner at the home of Dr. Hans Frank, minister without portfolio. Some 40 guests, sitting down at the table, admitted the heavy curtains that covered the long windows.

"I wonder who's behind those curtains?" a woman asked in jest. "Of course the Gestapo," her partner shot back. The knowing laughter that greeted this indication of the idea was by no means impossible. Just say, "Gestapo," as you sit with friends in a cafe. Everyone will look furtively, lower his voice, guard his speech. The Gestapo intervenes in every sphere of life. Dr. Werner Best, provincial police president of Hessen, asserts:

"A complete catalogue of activities dangerous to the state" can never be compiled, because it can never be foreseen in what way the leadership (of the state) and the people may be endangered."

Has Wide Powers

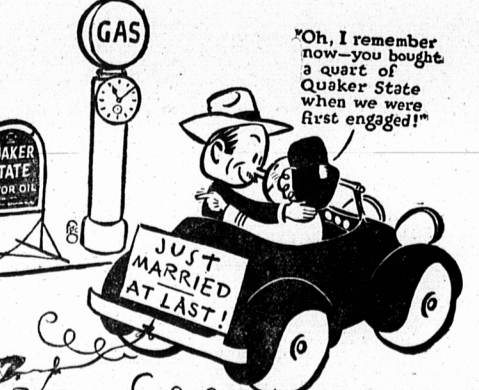

It may also confiscate property and publications and disband societies.

Before the system of telephone eavesdropping had been perfected, the Gestapo apparently assigned the same operative to listen in on the home and office phones of a suspect. This resulted occasionally in crossed wires. A man telephoning from his office to a friend might suddenly hear his wife at the same time telephoning from home to some woman of her acquaintance.

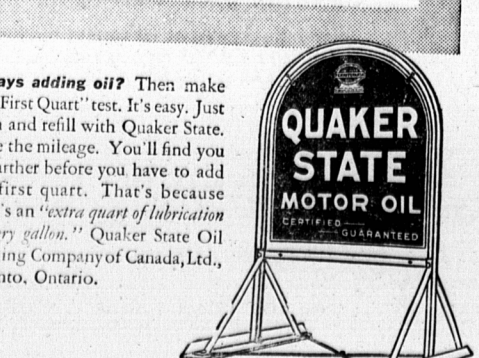
