THE MEETING OF PARLIAMENT.

Lord Grey's speech at the opening of Parliament provides an unusually full bill of fare. The revision of the tariff is an important undertaking upon which a committee of ministers has been engaged for many months. They have gone over the long schedules item by item, listening to the opinions of many interested persons, and it will be surprising indeed if there are not a great many minor changes proposed which, whether they leave the general rate of customs taxation about as it is, or make it a little higher or lower, will necessarily provoke a good deal of discussion.

Besides the tariff revision there are many important measures promised touching insurance, the re-arrangement of provincial subsidies, the election laws, the post office, inspection of fish and meats, the regulation of patent medicines, dealing with juvenile offenders, allotting more members to the new Provinces and delimiting new electoral divisions there.

CAPE TO CAIRO.

The South African war and the world-wide benefactions of Cecil Rhodes have given to the world, and especially to British subjects, a deep interest in the development of the African continent, and notably in Rhodes' great project of a central highway, from end to end through that land of darkness and mystery.

The present state of the route is that over 2,000 miles of the railway are in operation north from Cape Town, and some 1,500 miles of rail and water transportation southward from Cairo. A section of 410 miles of railway is now under construction, to connect the existing systems with the southern extremity of Lake Tanganyika.

The death is announced of Senator Kerr, of Coburg at the age of 70. Senator Kerr was a lawyer of considerable prominence and sat in the House of Commons for West Northumberland, 1874-8. He was called to the Senate in March 1900. His death followed upon his undergoing a severe operation in the Toronto General Hospital.

A DISGRUNTLED JOURNAL.

H. B. S. Birch of Port Hill in a Summerside paper publishes an account sales of three small consignments of smelts sold for him by Frank J. Leach & Co. wholesale fish dealers, 14 T. Wharf Boston. Mr. Birch complains that the returns were disappointing. The Summerside paper referred to makes the correspondence between the parties a basis for some uncharitable reflections upon the Boston firm in question and in "pleased to state that Messrs Frank J. Leach & Co's advertisement is not found" in its columns, "but is found in the Charlottetown Guardian." This shows at the outset the animus of the journal in question. The firm which has aroused its censure does not advertise in its columns, but has selected another and more desirable medium!

Now we greatly regret that Mr. Birch has had the unpleasant experience which he relates, but we fail to see in what the correspondence discloses anything more than what frequently occurs in transactions between two entirely upright and honorable business firms. Briefly stated Mr. Birch appears to have consigned to Messrs Leach & Co three parcels of smelts, of 35, 30 and 30 pounds each respectively, which were sold, the first for 10 cents, and the others for 12 cents per pound, a total of \$9.50. The charges against this were: Express \$3.44; Duties \$3.40; Commission 47 cents, and cartage 20 cents, a total of \$7.50.

Mr Birch had complained in the proper quarter of the high customs duties and express charges, for which Messrs Leach & Co. were in no way responsible, all would have seen the reasonableness of his complaint. It does not appear, however, that he could justly complain of the very modest total commission of 47 cents received by the Boston firm, and as to the charge of ten cents cartage on each of two packages, it was explained, to him that this was an actual outlay necessary to have the goods placed in the market in time for the morning sale. These facts seem necessary to be stated on behalf of Messrs Leach & Co., who, where they are best known, have a high reputation for square and honest dealing.

In fact we believe there are no more honorable and straightforward fishdealers to be found anywhere than Frank J. Leach & Co. of Boston. The Guardian has enjoyed the patronage of scores of New York and Boston fish dealers for years past, is publishing now some four columns of their business advertisements and has never dealt with a more honest or honorable lot of business men. We make this statement without excepting any one firm, even those who have not advertised with us. Mr Birch has no doubt had an unpleasant experience but we are satisfied that the fault is not with Frank J. Leach & Co. Mr Leach personally handles all consignments and does the very best he can for his customers.

In many cases shipped smelts arrive in Boston either all, or in part, so badly damaged as to be unfit for sale as food and the person offering such to the public is liable to prosecution and fine or imprisonment. Smelts are placed in heated cars by express companies and thus are spoiled on arrival; they also quite often arrive one or more days later than they should and probably just at a time when the market is overloaded. Invariably, dealers do not get enough from the sale of such

consignments to pay them for the freight and duty they guarantee. In other cases dealers frequently remunerate shippers out of their own pocket, and the latter are not made aware of the fact. Frank J. Leach & Co., have had scores of shipments from various sections of this Province with which the shippers were well satisfied, and it must be a source of satisfaction to them that in the one only case of complaint above referred to the facts appear to be strongly in their favor.

Halifax and St. John are both deeply interested in the so-called race between the C. P. R. Steamer Empress and the train which carries to the west the mail which the Empress brought across the Atlantic. The C. P. R. people would gladly avoid the call at Halifax, and would prefer to bring the mails to St. John. The competition now on is for the C. P. R. to deliver the Empress passengers in Montreal as near as may be to the time when the mails arrive there by the I. C. R.

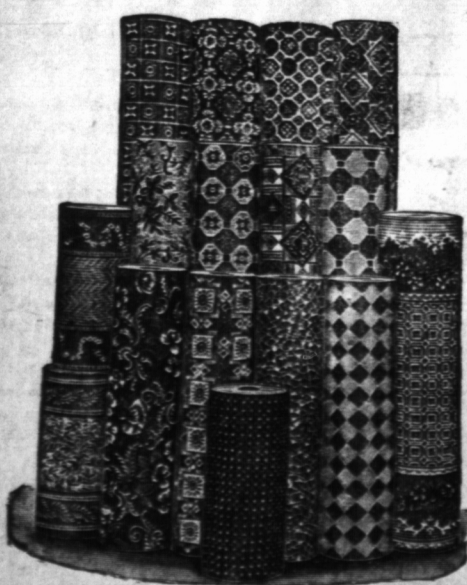
