**MR. RAPHAEL GAUDET**

The death occurred in this city on Saturday morning from pneumonia of Raphael Gaudet, aged 77. He was born in Tignish and was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Stanislaus Gaudet (nee Blanche Myers).

For many years he worked in lobster canneries as can maker and sealer, first in his native village and later with the late H. W. Longworth and the Fisher Windsor Limited of Charlottetown.

In 1920 he gave up that work and was for a time employed as carpenter. He has been in Charlottetown for about 50 years.

Mr. Gaudet was a faithful, capable workman and a good citizen made many friends who will deeply regret his passing.

He leaves to mourn a widow, nee Elizabeth McInnis of Souris, one son Angus S. **In Memoriam**

Alban Gerard Paquet, son of Mr. and Mrs. William J. Paquet of Souris, died at the Charlottetown Hospital on September sixteenth.

Until two weeks previous to this date Alban had been at work with his usual activity, and devotedness. Becoming seriously ill he was taken to the Charlottetown Hospital where every possible attention and kindness were given him. His beloved young wife, his dear father and mother were with him continually in his hours of suffering. The good Sisters and nurses were admirable in their endeavors to bring comfort and relief to their patient, and many priests in their kindness came to bring spiritual consolation to this model young man.

With full consciousness of the gravity of his illness and of the proximity of death he calmly prepared to meet his Creator and Judge.

His deep devotion to Saint Teresa of Lissieux seems to have won for him the literal fulfillment of her promise: "I shall spend my Heaven in doing good upon earth. I shall let fall a shower of roses" for, a few hours before his death when he was asked, "Are you going to Heaven, Alban?" he answered with conviction, "Yes, I see roses falling."

Little Aubie, as he was familiarly known, was kind to everyone. His character had won for him a large number of friends one of whom gave this consoling testimony: "I worked side by side with Alban for a year and I admired his ever cheerful disposition. I have only pleasant memories of him."

For the past four years the deceased had been a valued employee of the firm of Peters and Gallant of North Rustico. He is mourned as a conscientious and efficient worker, a man of keen business ability.

Alban took a lively interest too in all parish activities. He was one of the cheerful givers whom the Lord loves.

The funeral Mass was sung at North Rustico by Reverend Clarence Pitre, uncle of the deceased, and the crowded church gave evidence of the esteem in which the young man was held in the community. May he rest in peace.
