

Mr. and Mrs. Blair were at breakfast in the Sanitarium on Saturday, when one of the guests came over to tender his sympathy. Mr. Blair was astonished at the remark, and then friends pointed to the sad Ottawa despatch in the newspaper which he had in his hand.

THE POPULATION OF QUEBEC.

ICE BREAKER A FAILURE.

The Great Yermack Unable to Force Its Way Through the Kara Sea.

The great Russian icebreaker Yermack, with Admiral Makaroff on board, has returned to Tromsø, North Norway, after endeavoring in vain to force its way through the ice of the Kara sea to the mouth of the Yenisei river, Siberia, says the New York Sun. Its purpose was to steam around the north end of Novaya Zemla and break its way through the ice of the Kara sea to the Yenisei. It was found, however, that the ice of the Kara sea was too heavy to be broken by the Yermack, in spite of the great weight and powerful machinery of that vessel.

The failure of the Yermack to carry out Admiral Makaroff's plans for last summer's work disposes of the scheme, in which he has reposed much faith, of finally settling the question of the North Pole by making a journey to it on his ice breaker. He has repeatedly expressed his confidence that the Yermack could break a road through any Arctic ice, and he proposed to command the ship on a voyage to the Pole.

The failure of the Yermack this year, however, proves the impracticability of his scheme, as far as the Yermack, at least, is concerned. It is possible for an ice breaker to force its way to the North Pole the achievement can be accomplished only by a vessel that is heavier and more powerful than the Yermack.

This greatness however has abundantly proved its usefulness for commercial purposes. The vessel was built to break up the ice of the Baltic so as to give ships access to Russian ports and rivers at times when they are usually closed by ice. In March 1893, the Yermack fresh from the shipyards where it was built entered the frozen port of Kronstadt with comparative ease and then going to Revel liberated thirty three vessels of a value of \$7,500,000, so that they were able to go on their way with their cargoes. Then returning to Kronstadt and St. Petersburg the Yermack opened the way for the entrance of forty steamers several weeks before the ordinary time.

In 1899, the Yermack was subjected to still severer tests. She went to Spitzbergen about the close of the season of navigation, pushed into the polar ice and made a journey through the pack ice. She travelled in the pack about 290 miles. Her powerful machinery drove her bow far up on the ice that was fourteen feet thick. Invariably the great weight of the vessel broke the ice and the Yermack went on its way at an average speed of three or four knots an hour. Such work as this makes ice breaking in the Baltic, where the ice is not likely to exceed five feet in thickness, mere child's play. There is no doubt that the Yermack is more than able to cope with any ice that is ever met in the Baltic.

The result of this severe polar test confirmed Admiral Makaroff in his opinion that the Yermack would be able to cope with any ice in the Arctic regions. The result of this year's work, however, shows that he underestimated the thickness and toughness of portions of the polar pack. The Yermack is never likely to be of much service in the field of exploration.

CITY COUNCIL MEETING

A Short and Unimportant Session Held Last Night.

The regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held last night. His Worship and all the Councillors, with the exception of Coun. Brown being present. A letter was read from Col. W. Aylmer in reference to the presenting to the city of three guns now in the possession of the Militia Department. The letter states that the D. O. C. has been instructed to hand the guns over to the city, and the Mayor is authorized to instruct the city surveyor to cause the guns to be removed to Queen's Square.

A letter was read from the Charlottetown Light and Power Co. in reference to the increasing of the rate of lighting of the city building.

A petition was presented asking for the removal of the old scale house at the foot of Queen street. This matter was ordered to lay on the table.

A communication was read from the Secretary of the Board of Fire Underwriters relating to the securing of additional fire hose. It was resolved that the same be referred to the Fire Board for consideration.

A letter from J. J. O'Reilly calling attention to the dangerous condition of a sidewalk on Douglas street. On motion it was resolved that the letter be handed to the City Surveyor with instructions to have the matter attended to.

Coun. McDonald gave the following notice:

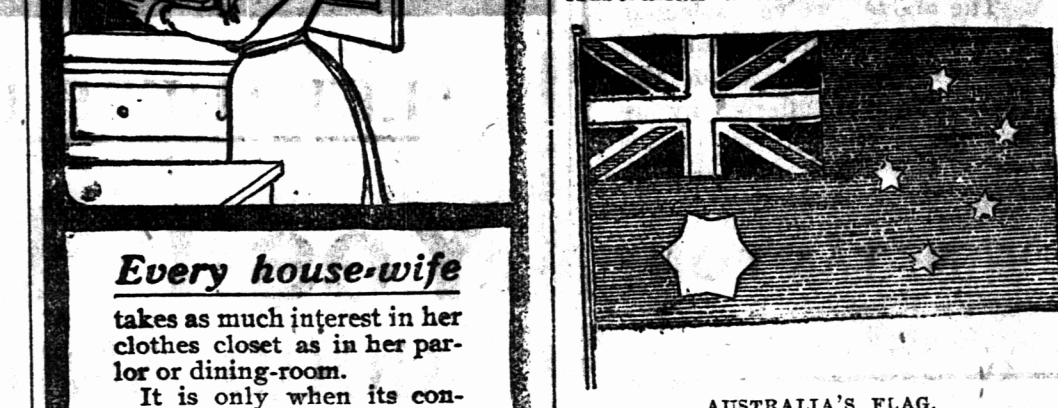
That he would at the next monthly meeting of the Council move a resolution for an increase of \$50 each in the yearly pay of the Marshall and police officers.

Upon motion it was resolved that hereafter any person presenting a certificate from a clergyman or city Clerk or the city Marshall that the person applying is unable to pay for vaccination, said certificate shall be accepted by every duly qualified medical doctor in the city of Charlottetown and upon the presentation of said certificate to the Council the sum of 40 cents shall be paid, this to include vaccine.—Carried.

Enrollment of recruits for the Canadian Yeomanry took place yesterday at the Drill Shed. There were seventeen applicants for positions of whom only twelve could be accepted. Seven of the number had already seen service in South Africa. Three others had served a year with the Royal Canadian Regiment at Halifax. On the whole a superior lot of men have been selected who will do no discredit to Prince Edward Island. The men were tested in riding and shooting. They were all riders while some were good. The shooting was exceptionally good, seven out of the twelve making 40 points and over out of a possible 50. The men are being held in readiness to leave at an hour's notice to proceed to Halifax. Col. Moore will report the other men who have offered to the department and there is still a possibility of their being accepted if more men are needed.
