THE MCKENNA-MITCHELL FIASCO
 Prince Edward Island boys fans were much disappointed after reading the report of the recent McKenna Mitchell bout held in Gloucester Bay on New Year's afternoon. The fans are wondering yet. Wondering what got into McKenna and some are actually asking—was it the "filthy lucre" that tempted Jack to lose his good name in the Maritime Provinces, the home of big-hearted and honest people.
 According to reports from various exchanges, the bout was the biggest

fraud ever perpetrated in Cape Breton—a fake from start to finish—so much so that the fans wanted their money back—and they should have been given a refund.

It is now up to McKenna to give a public statement to the press. He has a lot of explaining to do in order to hold the legion of friends and admirers he gained in the provinces by the sea by hard, clean and honest fights.

TIME FOR A CHANGE

Never in the history of Canadian amateur sport has the time been more opportune for a change in the rules and regulations than at present. The flood of outside hockey talent into the Maritimes this season, combined with the many changes made by our own players, clearly demonstrates that the resident rule and other such fool ideas cannot be made workable. The one month resident clause was regarded as a joke when it was first introduced and it has been clearly shown within the past few weeks that it cannot hold water.

In fact its sole purpose, that of endeavoring to control amateur sport, has been thrown to the winds, with the result that never before in the history of Maritime hockey has the so-called amateur game leaned so strongly towards professional interests. The six months clause made it necessary to bring in players, if required, a long time before the hockey season opened. It meant a great deal of extra expense to the club endeavoring to win a Maritime title. It also meant that amateur sport was getting the small end of a very long stick.

The number of players brought into the Maritimes, the number of shifts that have been made for hockey purposes only, is certainly becoming astounding to an average minded hockey follower. This state of affairs is much more evident in Nova Scotia than any other section of the Maritimes. It seems to be a rage in certain sections.

Halifax has a larger number of players from Upper Canada than any other place in the three Provinces; New Glasgow has two; and Truro are said to be angling for one or two, and other places have been reinforced with Maritime stars that played with other teams last winter.

It is clearly evident that the residence rule is not big enough to handle the situation. Neither are the amateur rules of the present day big enough to take in amateur sport in general. Again I ask, why should any athlete in the Maritime Provinces lose employment to satisfy the general public? It is not proper from any standpoint and is not feasible or workable under any organized body. It is surely time for a change.—(New Glasgow News.)

FLAGRANT DISREGARD OF COLLEGE CLAUSE IN THE REGULATIONS

Charged By Maritime Branch President—Men Must Attend Classes Regularly Or Certificates Will Be Cancelled Is Ruling Of Sport Head—General Shake-Up Is Expected.

TRURO, Jan. 4.—That the residence clause in the Canadian Amateur Hockey Regulations will be strictly enforced was the declaration of I. Logan Barnhill and Frank Wilson, secretary and president of M. A. H. A. here tonight. Particular reference was made to the concession given hockey players who attend colleges in other than their home towns. The shifting of players from one club to another that has been prevalent this season all over the Maritimes under the students' clause is believed to be the result of flagrant disregard for the privileges accorded those who are forced to leave home to continue studies.

KERR'S CASE
 Speaking of the difficulty that "Pop" Kerr found himself in, Mr. Barnhill said that he had received a playing certificate from Chatham which had apparently Kerr's signature to it and he issued the certificate along with the others. However, he was informed the next day by Kerr personally when he presented his application for a playing certificate with the Bearcats that he had not signed any certificate to play this season with Chatham and if there was any application showing his signature it was a forgery.

CHARGES FORGEBY
 Mr. Barnhill did a little quiet investigating and found that the only amateur card issued for Kerr this year by the M. P. B. A. A. U. of C. was for Truro. Later Kerr in a sworn affidavit stated he had signed his application for playing certificate except with Truro, so Mr. Barnhill immediately cancelled the Chatham certificate and is going to issue him a certificate for Truro at once. The officials said that when clubs start adopting such methods it is high time to put the screws on.

So far as Truro Bearcats are concerned there are at the present time only seven amateur cards out and these are all for local players with the exception of Sammy Murdoch. The outsiders who have been in the town and given a tryout have all gone back to their respective homes. What is in the offing is hard to ascertain, but one thing is certain, and that is that Wilson and Barnhill are going to keep hockey amateur as far as possible this season.

GENERAL SHAKE-UP
 It is expected that there will be a general shake-up before the season closes in some of the clubs. Unless every intention of the hockey regulations is adhered to some teams will, before the season closes, find it difficult to muster up a squad to carry on so far as amateur hockey is concerned. This is given at this time more as a warning than a threat. Students must not play truant from their classes in the word, and it is expected that colleges in the Maritimes will have better attendance than ever.
