**THE MEDITERRANEAN SQUADRON.**

Nearly all the ships of Admiral Wierzbicki which left the Mediterranean some weeks ago for the East have returned, only one large ship remaining in the Red Sea. Originally this squadron came from the Baltic. The farthest point eastward that was reached was Jibuti in French Somaliland, which is about 6,500 miles from Kronstadt in the Baltic and some 7,000 miles from Port Arthur. In other words the ships did not make one half their intended journey. And yet it was the part of prudence to turn back. Almost certain destruction awaited them had they proceeded to the East as they would have been intercepted by the Japanese fleet and compelled to fight against superior force. And yet these ships are homeless in the Mediterranean. Russia has no port or station there. Nor can they enter the Black Sea, for the passage of armed vessels through the Dardanelles is forbidden by treaty.

We shall learn before long whether or not Russia will send more ships to the East. If she decides to do so she will no doubt send a strong force, and the difficulties in the way of this are tremendous. The ships would be under necessity of taking coal transports along and of coaling at sea. We do not think it likely that the permission of the powers or of a majority of them can be obtained to permit the Russian Black Sea fleet to come out and proceed eastward. It may even be doubted whether Russia will press the point. In some respects it is to her advantage to have the gate of the Dardanelles closed, as the rule which prohibits her warships from coming out prevents the entrance of possibly hostile fleets to the Black Sea. We cannot tell in advance what Russia's designs are, but should the attempt

be made to take her Baltic and Mediterranean squadrons to the east the Japanese would at least have timely notice. The movement must be made in the open. The fleet would be noted as it passed Gibraltar, the Suez canal and other points on the way. Thus forewarned the Japanese admiral would necessarily endeavor to intercept the Russian ships on the way and compel them to fight before effecting a junction with Admiral Makaroff's fleet at Port Arthur. It becomes more and more a matter of doubt whether Russia will send any more ships eastward, but if it is decided to do so the movement will not probably be long delayed.

Somebody has played a low-down trick on Editor Fraser of the New Glasgow Chronicle. It was in the form of a campaign poem under the heading, "Sinclair's the Man." But while the limping stanzas sounded the praise of Sinclair, the initial letters of the lines, in succession were made to spell the words "Foolish Fraser." It was an acrostic and the editor did not suspect the trick until the campaign rhyme had appeared in print.

Over in Massachusetts they are still discussing the advantages of reciprocity with Canada. But how are our neighbors to get reciprocity if the Canadians do not want it? Canada was once unmistakably desirous of reciprocity. The treaty of 1854-56 was approved in British America, and our people would then have gladly continued and extended it. But our neighbors terminated it. For years afterwards our leaders of both parties sought to have it renewed in some form, but our arguments fell upon deaf ears on the other side of the line. Since then we have discovered that we can get along very well without reciprocity, in fact the Dominion has prospered far in excess of the old reciprocity days. Our New England neighbors would now like reciprocity, but it takes two to make a bargain, and one of the two is not just now in a bargaining mood.

Ohio is not a southern state, nor one of the old slave states, but in Springfield, the state capital, quite recently a negro was brutally lynched. The police who had the prisoner in charge made no real attempt to stay the mob. Not a shot was fired. Possibly the negro deserved to die. He was charged with having shot a policeman and was awaiting trial. The reason assigned for the lawless act was that twelve murders in succession had been committed in the county in which Springfield is situated within two years, and no one had been executed for either of these crimes. There is a marked contrast between the Republic and the Dominion in that regard, but even on this side the tendency is toward laxity in the administration of justice. The pardoning power has also been greatly abused. Should this laxity extend we shall yet have lynch law take place of our judicial system. Hitherto we have had no lynching in Canada and may Heaven preserve us from such disgrace.
