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# NAZI NAVAL BASE OF WILHELMSHAVEN HARD HIT

## Fresh German Troops and Tank Forces Repulsed

## Stalingrad Defenders Smash Successive Enemy Assaults

MOSCOW, Sept. 16 (Wednesday)—(AP)—The Red army defenders at Stalingrad smashed successive assaults by fresh German troops and tanks and repulsed them yesterday, while the city and southwest of the embattled Volga city, which already is in flames from steady Nazi dive-bomber raids, it was announced today.

Although the Germans succeeded in advancing yesterday southwest of the city, the Russians later threw them back in a counter-attack which disabled seven Nazi tanks and dispersed two infantry companies, it was said in a Tuesday midnight communique.

## Attacks Repulsed

West of Stalingrad "repeated attacks" by fresh German troops and tank forces also were repulsed, the communique said, and one Russian unit which fought for one inhabited locality "destroyed three German tanks, five guns, and wiped out more than 350 enemy officers and men."

Sgt. Prentiss Blair Andrew, R.C.A.F., who was recently reported missing after operations on July 28. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. H. Andrew, 151 Euston Street, Charlottetown.

Sgt. Andrew, a former Provincial speed skating champion, joined the Royal Canadian Air Force in the fall of 1940 as a student pilot. Later he was re-classified as a Wireless Air Gunner. After undergoing training in Western Canada, he went overseas on Christmas Day 1941.

Sgt. Andrew was educated at West Kent School and Prince of Wales College in Charlottetown. He was an outstanding performer in local sporting circles. Besides being a speed skater, he was a member of the hockey team for the city of the Abegweit and was a star football player on one of the city teams.

He is 24 years of age. Two other brothers, Wilbur and Avon, are also on active service. The former is with the Royal Canadian Artillery, Anti-Aircraft, and the latter with the Divisional Signals. A brother, David, is at home. One sister, Mrs. J. V. Roach, resides in Halifax.

COLOMBO, Ceylon, Sept. 15 (CP)—The Cingalese have proclaimed Sgt. L. Len Birchall of Saint John as a hero for his gallant leadership of the 1st Battalion of the Cingalese in the defense of the island of Ceylon.

## War Situation Last Night

Although the battle of Stalingrad holds the spotlight in the war news, developments in the Atlantic, in Egypt and the Balkans have definite significance.

The British commando-type raid on Tobruk, Marshal Rommel's major advance base and probably the site of his chief tank and truck repair operations, points strongly toward an impending British counter-offensive in Egypt. Coupled with the simultaneous landing raid operations at El Daba behind the Nazi sea flank, the Tobruk operation looms as a prelude to a formidable British attempt to drive Rommel out of Egypt before he can recover from his recent repulse.

## Japanese Bases Bombed In Burma

NEW DELHI, Sept. 15 (CP)—The Japanese in Burma, who in two raids upon Rangoon killed 1,102 persons last Christmas season, felt the impact of the United States air force twice in the last week, it was announced today.

Brig-Gen. Clayton L. Bissell's headquarters of the United States air forces here reported that in the first of the raids last Wednesday a medium bomber scored hits in a railroad yard near Moguang while fighters strafed a 200-foot river boat 15 miles south of Myitkya, sending the craft out of control and forcing passengers to jump overboard.

## Orders Fuel Oil Rationed On U.S. Atlantic Seaboard

WASHINGTON, Sept. 15 (AP)—Chairman Donald M. Nelson of the War Production Board today ordered fuel oil rationing on the United States Atlantic seaboard and in 13 middle western states to take effect during the coming winter.

Until rationing starts Nov. 30, deliveries of fuel oil will be controlled in 39 states and middle western states and the District of Columbia.

Beginning Oct. 1, no deliveries may be made without a written guarantee from the consumer that he will surrender ration coupons to be issued, subsequently and the ration plan equivalent to any deliveries.

## Strafe Jap Shipping On Kiska

AN ALASKAN ARMY BASE, Sept. 15 (AP)—(Delayed)—American fighter planes have strafed Japanese shipping and men on Kiska for the first time since the island was occupied.

The spectacular raid by two fighters followed a "comber" trip made by Brig-Gen. William O. Butler, commander of the Alaskan Air Force, who led a low-level attack three days ago.

The fighters made a second dive on the harbor and raked a converted yacht which they thought might be floating command post. They observed a number of sea mines and under the concentrated machine gun fire.

## Alberta Gov't Defaults On Bond Payments

EDMONTON, Sept. 15 (CP)—The Alberta Government defaulted today on a maturity of \$2,948,000 worth of provincial bonds payable in Canada and New York.

## New Canadian Minesweeper Is Commissioned

TORONTO, Sept. 15 (CP)—The men who built H.M.C.S. Westmount and the H.M.C.S. who will sail and fight met today as the new minesweeper was handed over to the Royal Canadian Navy and dedicated to the cause of the Dominion, the Empire and the Westmount.

## Chief of Allied Land Pacific Forces Hopeful

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, Australia, Sept. 15 (AP)—Gen. Sir Thomas Blamey, chief of Allied land forces in the Pacific, declared today that he is "uniquely" confident that the enemy to advance through the jungles to within 40 miles of Port Moresby in New Guinea.

Gen. Blamey returned from an inspection tour of the New Guinea sector, said that while the Japanese had crossed the Owen Stanley range the rest of the going to Port Moresby would be far from easy.

## Enemy Air Activity Nil Over Britain

LONDON, Sept. 15 (AP)—British planes were on the alert today on the west coast of the delectable Russian planes apparently were making another attack tonight on Budapest, one of the targets in the recently opened aerial offensive in Nazi eastern territory.

A Reuters dispatch from Stockholm today said Swedish journalists in Berlin reported that planes, believed to be British and American, last night bombed parts of Bulgaria. Details of these raids were lacking.

## Wilhelmshaven Hard Hit

This second anniversary of Britain's "aerial Trafalgar" found the ends of the offensive reversed, with the great naval base of Wilhelmshaven smoking and strewn with wreckage from bombing by a strong R.A.F. force.

## Tobruk Assault Warships Back In Alexandria

CAIRO, Sept. 15 (AP)—The British warships which bombarded the Libyan stronghold of Tobruk Sunday night in the Allies' big land-sea-air attack arrived safely in Alexandria yesterday under the protection of long-range fighters which beat off wave after wave of Axis dive-bombers, it was disclosed tonight.

## Survivors From Merchant Ships

MONTREAL, Sept. 15 (CP)—Almost 80 survivors of Allied nations merchant ships arrived in Montreal yesterday and spent the night in a local convalescent home. The men will remain in Montreal until new berths are found for them aboard other vessels.
