Fold into sugar mixture. Add two more tablespoons of cream and one teaspoon of vanilla. Chill in serving bowl and serve with a hot pudding.

**CHRISTMAS PUDDING**  
One pound stoned raisins, 1 pound currants, 1 pound beef suet, 3-4 pound sugar, 2 ounces lemon peel, 2 ounces orange peel, 2 ounces citron peel, 6 ounces flour, 1-4 pound bread-crumbs, a little nutmeg, cinnamon, cloves and salt.
