ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

SIGNS OF THE TIMES.—There have been quite severe frosts for three nights past and last night wild geese passed over the town.

THE case of Robert Vaniderstine, vs. Christopher McLean, for employing a station in the city without license, was again brought up for hearing at the Police Court yesterday and was dismissed.

AT Glen William, Lot 63, September 14th Mary Stewart McInnis the dearly beloved wife of Mr. Archibald McInnis, aged 53 years. The departed was one of those meek and gentle Christians whose whole life gives out the fragrance of the graces of the Holy Spirit in word and deed. Before her departure her faith in her Redeemer was bright and clear; she longed to be removed from this earthly tabernacle to the house not made with hands eternal in the heavens. Her memory will be long remembered in the neighborhood and congregation of Caledonia of which she was a true and faithful member in full communion. A large company followed her mortal remains to the cemetery at Caledonia. The burial services were conducted at the house and at the grave by the Rev. J. Sutherland and Rev. S. D. McPhee of Lochaber, Nova Scotia. She has left behind her a sorrowing husband, one son, four daughters, three brothers and two sisters to mourn the loss of a loving wife, a gentle mother and an affectionate sister.

THE home of Thomas Ayers, St. Avarde, was the scene of an interesting ceremony last evening when his daughter, Miss Emily F. was united in marriage to W. E. Leard, formerly of Tryon and now of Souris. Both bride and groom were unattended and little Harold Leard acted as page. The ceremony was performed by Rev. J. W. McConnell, assisted by Rev. Silas Hicks, in the presence of immediate friends. The bride was dressed in a suit of cream nun's veiling, trimmed with white silk and applique. Both bride and groom are well and favorably known in many parts of the province, the former being one of our most successful school teachers, and the latter one of the most esteemed residents of Souris. The wedding gifts were expressive of the high regard entertained towards the contracting parties. The happy couple leave this morning on a few days holiday trip after which they will reside in Souris. The Guardian wishes Mr. and Mrs. Leard much happiness.

On Saturday orders were issued by the Commanding officer, for a sham fight between the 12th and 14th Brigades. The 12th Brigade was the attacking party and marched out of the camp grounds at 8 o'clock a. m. After they had marched about ten miles out, the Brigade Major divided his brigade into fighting lines and told the Commanding Officers of Regts. that they might do the best they could with their Regts.

In the meanwhile, the 14th Brigade which had been left to defend the camp, dug trenches strengthened redoubts and made wire fence to stop the enemy or at least to keep them back for a time.

At 12 o'clock the enemy were sighted and received a salute from the field artillery in camp. The enemy came on steadily amidst the firing of the defenders and themselves.

Soon the firing became continuous and about one o'clock the enemy had completely surrounded the camp. During all this time, the 82nd Regiment had never been seen by any of the scouts and it was thought by some that the Regiment had taken a wrong direction and got lost. But they had not, for the men were steadily creeping upon the fort through long grass. Not a shot was fired by the gallant boys, until within the distance of one hundred paces when the command "fire" was given low and stern. With one simultaneous crash the rifles cracked and with a rousing cheer the 82nd gained the fort first and wrenched it out of the defender's hands.

This was under the very eye of the general. The Regiment was praised for the way in which they held their distance while in extended order. Although this was supposed to be a mere show yet it was not without its bloodshed, Gunner Chester of the 78th Regiment had his face severely injured by a powder burn. The Hussars did good work too and received their share of praise.

A DOUKHOBOR STORY.

ODESSA, Sept. 15.—The attention of the Russian government having been called to the probability of the Doukhobors (Russian Quakers), in Canada applying for permission to repatriate themselves to their old homes in the Caucasus, it is semi-officially announced that such permission will not be accorded, and it is said to be extremely doubtful if the Doukhobors will be even allowed to proceed to Siberia.

LONDON, Sept. 15.—A despatch received here from Liverpool says J. P. Morgan has purchased from J. B. Ellerman, chair of the Leyland line, five steamers engaged in trade between Antwerp and Montreal. It is understood, the despatch says, that the vessels will be managed by the Leyland line.
