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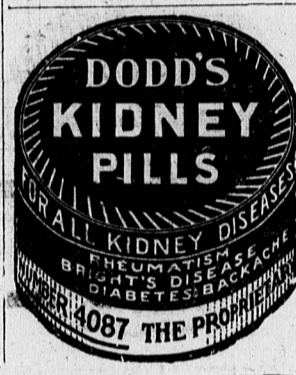

CASE DISMISSED.—The case against Mr. Alvre Arsenault in connection with the recent unfortunate automobile collision, in which a child was killed under Tuesday and yesterday at the City Court, before Stipendiary Magistrate Martin. The Crown was represented by Mr. Claire Campbell, Mr. Gilbert Gaudet, K. C., representing the defendant. After receiving all the evidence on both sides, Mr. Arsenault was acquitted. The case was dismissed as purely accidental. It was found that some evidence submitted at this trial, and had also been given at the coroner's inquest, would not stand verification when put to the test, and could not be accepted as evidence. Mr. Arsenault is an upright, industrious citizen, married with a family, and no one regrets the accident more than Mr. Arsenault. One point of great importance, which came out during the trial, was the prevalent idea that car drivers should guard their right is not correct, and that the law still specifies that drivers must guard their left. It must be very gratifying to Mr. Arsenault and his many friends in town and country that he has been honorably acquitted from this serious charge. This is only another warning to all car drivers to use the utmost care in driving, as it does not take very much sometimes to cause a serious accident, from which any driver may find it difficult to exonerate himself.
