Tricks of Nerve and Heart

LONDON, May 1.—The sudden death of a 15-year-old lad while playing football has been ascribed to the stoppage of the heart's action owing to "reflex nerve impulses."

There have been cases, in which an inhibition of the heart took place from a small cause. A woman had died from this cause after she had been tapped in a playful manner by a boy on what was called the "Adam's apple."

Several other cases have occurred recently of what is becoming known as sudden death by inhibition, that is to say, by excessive stimulation of the vagus nerve. The condition is the same in kind as the familiar experience "My heart stood still" under the stress of fright or other emotion.

Inhibition explains the tragedy of a powerful young man of 21, who was knocked by a blow on the side of his neck, and fell down dead.

In a still more recent case a man of 52 dies as his wife was buttoning on his collar, thus causing pressure on his neck.

There is little doubt that some of the tragedies in the boxing ring have been due to the same cause. A very similar case explains the death of a man who had a great fear of operations, and died as his needle was being with drawn through which to administer a local anesthetic before the operation was begun.

In yet another case, a man buried for many hours under a landslide, and able to converse with his would-be rescuers, died as soon as the heavy plank compressing his chest was removed. In most of these cases the brain was noted to be very large and the skull very thin.

Germans Remove Taxes To Foster Linen Trade

(United Press.)

BERLIN, May 5.—With a view of encouraging the manufacture of linen textiles, the German government has removed the export license and tax for these goods. According to the German Chamber of Commerce in America the export tax has been the greatest obstacle in the revival of the export trade here.

Exporters have been making strenuous efforts to secure shipments so as to put them on a basis similar to that which prevailed prior to the war. Simultaneously with removal of the export license and tax the removal of import licenses is planned, and already has been put into effect for a number of foreign products.

The German linen industry, like all other industries, has been placed upon a gold mark basis. The Chamber's trade report says the price of linen yarn, compared with peace time prices, is now 60 per cent less, while cotton and corn yarn in New York has increased from 14 cents in 1914 to 37 cents, indicating an increase of nearly 200 per cent. Due to this fact, says the report, the German linen industry virtually has recovered, as today flax has replaced cotton, therefore linen textiles are lower in price than cotton textiles and their substitutes. The report assumes, however, that gradually linen prices will reach the price level of cotton textiles.

It is reported that employment in the linen industry has been favorable recently, and that the mills have been able to dispose of their products at fair prices. Merchants say that because of the unsettled conditions prevailing here it is not likely that Germany will be able to consume the linen output to any great extent, and that therefore manufacturers will be forced to look to foreign markets for their products.

Great Wealth In Western Provinces

WINNIPEG, May 5.—Farmers of the prairie provinces received an aggregate income of \$381,600,647 on imports from their farms as a result of 1923 operations.

According to figures just released by government officials, the farmers of Manitoba were the recipients of a total income of \$86,223,503; Saskatchewan farmers \$171,557,750, while Alberta farmers received \$223,814,394.

Sale of their wheat brought the farmers by far the greatest proportion of their income on farm exports. Saskatchewan leads the way in the export of wheat, selling 219,000,000 bushels at an average of 65 cents a bushel. Alberta followed closely with the largest wheat crop in the history of the province disposing of 167,265,084 bushels at 65 cents a bushel. Manitoba farmers were paid an average price of 67 cents a bushel for their wheat, selling \$2,804,006 bushels during the year.

Though Saskatchewan netted a larger total return on its wheat production than the other provinces value received on this commodity represents nearly 80 per cent of the Saskatchewan farmers' total income for their farm products. On the other hand wheat contributed less than 50 per cent of the Alberta farmers' income and about 26 per cent of Manitoba's.

Alberta takes a long lead in the sale of oats by exporting 144,977,300 bushels which represents several million dollars more than the combined receipts of the farmers of Manitoba and Saskatchewan for this grain. Alberta was also in the lead for the sale of fodder crops receiving more than \$12,500,000 for the sale of hay and clover alone, a figure which is not nearly equalled by her sister provinces.

In the sale of dairy products and livestock the Alberta farmer netted more than the receipts of the Saskatchewan and Manitoba farmers combined incomes in this department.
