A Morning Smile

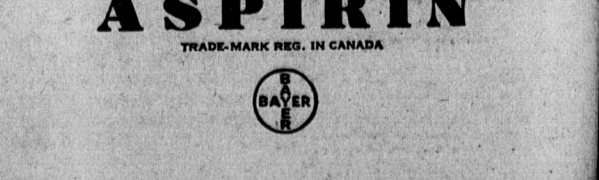

For The Cook

RUSK OR CRUMB PIE CRUST Put a lot of dry rusks on your moulding board, gently pound them with a rolling-pin, then roll them, pressing hard as a steam roller, until they are as fine as meal. To make sure of their fineness sift them through a wire strainer, and roll over again all that won't go through. Proceed in this way until you have two cups of crumbs. Stale slices of bread dried out in a cool oven until faintly brown, may be used instead of rusks, but do not omit the drying out in an oven. Next mix the rusk crumbs with

one-half a cup of brown sugar, and use three-fourths of a cup if there are bread crumbs. Then add one-half a cup of melted butter, and line a greased pie plate with all but a generous one-half cup of the mixture, saving this for a top crust. Use a custard or a cream pie filling for the pie.
