CROP PROSPECTS.—Dr. J. A. Clark of the Experimental Farm states that the prospects for good crops this year are excellent, or at least much better than usual. All the indications are also that fairly good prices will rule for the average produce of the farm, though he would not commit himself with regard to potato prices. There are doubts about the Cuban market, and that hitherto has always been relied upon to take the surplus from the Southern States market. Should the proposed new Marketing Board get into action by the Fall it should help considerably in effecting more orderly marketing, which would be to the distinct advantage of primary producers.

The following ministers are making application to be received into the United Church of Canada: Rev. W. S. Galbraith, from the Presbyterian Church; Rev. A. C. Luffman from the Presbyterian Church, and Rev. V. S. Latch from the Congregationalist Church of the U. S. Rev. D. M. Sinclair presented the Religious Education statistical report. The membership in our Sunday Schools stands at 5,900. \$996 was contributed to the M. & M. 158 Sunday School pupils came into full membership of the Church during the year. There are 48 young people's societies with a membership of 1,613. Last year they contributed \$978 to the M. & M. Fund, being the largest amount of any Presbytery in the Conference. Presbytery acquiesced in Dr. Ramsay's request for a change in pastoral relationships. Mr. W. C. Picketts, B.A., a graduate of Pine Hill Divinity Hall, was licensed to preach and recommended to Conference for ordination. An exchange of pulpits in the interests of the M. & M. Fund was arranged for the first Sunday after Conference: Rev. W. A. Paterson presented the report of the nominating committee as follows: Chairman, Rev. G. A. Christie; Secretary, Rev. W. E. Aitken; Treasurer, Rev. J. M. MacLeod; and the following as Conveners of the various committees: M. & M., Rev. G. A. Christie; Christian Education, Rev. D. M. Sinclair; Home Missions, Rev. F. E. Boothroyd; Foreign Missions, Rev. W. S. Loring; Evangelism and Social Service, Rev. J. L. Lund; Pensions, Rev. G. Ayers; Church Property, Rev. D. K. Ross; Examination of Students, Rev. G. N. Somers; Publications, Rev. M. A. MacMillan; Rural Life, Rev. G. C. Pringle; Historical, Rev. E. R. Woodside; Statistics, Rev. T. R. Goudge; Pastoral Relations, Rev. L. P. Archibald; and Boundaries, Rev. L. B. Campbell. The sessional committees for Conference were also appointed. Certain plans for the program for the next regular meeting of Presbytery were referred to Rev. J. W. A. Nicholson and the committee on Evangelism and Social Service.

United Church Presbytery Meeting

At its regular quarterly meeting held in Hearts Hall on Tuesday, May 8th, the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island of the United Church of Canada unanimously nominated Rev. C. E. Crowell, Amherst, N. S., for the office of President of the Maritime Conference. The Rev. George A. Christie, M. A., York, was nominated as Chairman of Presbytery for the ensuing year, and Rev. L. B. Campbell and Mr. Brewer Auld were nominated as representatives to the General Council.

The meeting opened with a large attendance of ministers and lay representatives. After Scripture reading by the Secretary and prayer by Rev. G. A. Christie the Court was constituted by the Chairman, Mr. Horace Wright, Rev. J. M. MacLeod reporting for the Conference Emergency Fund stated that \$113 out of the \$135 allocated had been contributed to date. The matter of the Millview Church, which is in a very poor state of repair, was presented by Rev. G. A. D. Elliott. It was referred to the Church Property Committee to which were added Rev. D. M. Sinclair and Mr. R. C. MacLeod, to meet with the congregation. The Canadian Pulpit, a new journal for Canadian preachers, published by the Alberta School of Religion, was brought to the attention of the members of the Court by the Secretary.

Rev. T. R. Goudge presented the statistical report. There was an increase of 89 resident church membership and 63 non-resident church members over 1932. There was a decrease of four in the number of auxiliaries of the W. M. E. A decrease of less than 4% in salaries paid ministers by congregations, and a decrease of less than 2% in the M. & M. Fund was indicated. The figures for the Missionary and Maintenance Fund were given by Rev. G. A. Christie. The total amount raised in 1933 was \$20,999, being \$558 short of last year. This amount represents 82% of our allocation from Conference. Twelve pastoral charges met their allocations in full, Montrose giving 129%. It was stated by Mr. Christie that only 234 copies of the Missionary Record are taken, about one family in twenty. The determining of allocations for 1934 was referred back to the M. & M. Committee. On the basis of amounts paid to salary and M. & M. the pastoral charge of Princeton stands first with an average of \$25.52 per family in 1933. Belfast-Belle River stands second in the Presbytery with an average of \$22.30 per family. The average for the Presbytery is about \$14.

Presbytery met at two o'clock with Rev. J. W. A. Nicholson in the Chair. Rev. M. D. MacGowan was reappointed to Wellington for another year, commencing July, 1934. The Secretary was instructed

RANDOM HOUSE CLEANING THOUGHTS

In cleaning the stones or bricks above the fire place that have become smoke stained during the winter, use plenty of clear hot water in a large pail in which

package of washing soda has been dissolved. Dip it out on a medium coarse scrubbing brush, letting excess water drip down into the pail which you will hold in your left hand. This strong soda solution cuts the grease and dirt of the smoke stain. Rinse with clean, clear water using brush for rinsing too. In putting up net glass curtains when using flat rods it is sometimes slow work. The rough ends of the rods frequently catch in the net. A small piece of one half inch adhesive tape, a little longer than the width of the rod, stuck across the end of the rod, turning down the ends of the plaster, enables one to run the rods through the hems in the curtains without any trouble. Tear the plaster off the end of the rod after curtains are on. This little temporary work equals well on round rods. MOTHS

May to July and September to October are the months when moths are most prevalent. They require constant watchfulness in order to exterminate them, especially from steam heated buildings. Beat, brush and sun garments. Put winter garments away early after being cleaned. Rugs and tapestries that are kept well cleaned with vacuum cleaners are less liable to be attacked by moths.

and the long centre runner had been left for a centre piece. Through some oversight the applied water was not discovered until the next morning when a long white water mark, still slightly damp, was discovered with dismay. The surface was dried, and a good grade of furniture polish poured over the white mark and allowed to stand there for hours. At intervals we rubbed the oil in with the finger tips and after four hours the wet wood absorbed much of the oil leaving the whitened place the same color as the remaining polished surface, but dull and slightly rough. Consequently regular rubbing and polishing with a fine furniture polish is gradually removing all traces of the water mark.
