SPECIAL meeting of the Charlottetown Board of Trade, will be held next Thursday evening, the 22nd inst., in their rooms at 8 o'clock to discuss the resolution presented at the annual meeting from the retail merchants association and other business.

Two representatives each from the Abegweit, Victorias and Crystal Pioneers met last night after the Senior game to decide the protest regarding the recent Abegweit-Victoria match. The vote stood 3 to 3 for not counting it. So the matter remains in abeyance.

At the Police Court yesterday the Prohibition cases against C.D. Rankin, Daniel A. McKinnon and G. A. Essery were dismissed for lack of evidence. The Prohibition case against George Arbuckle for second violation was adjourned for a week and that against Peter Paul Gillis till Friday next.

THE Minto left Pictou yesterday at seven o'clock and experienced heavy ice off Pictou Island which had come down from the westward and delayed her passage till after three o'clock. She arrived at Georgetown about six. The mails and passengers were brought to the city by the special that had been to Georgetown with those in attendance at the funeral of the late James Easton, Georgetown. The Minto will leave on return this morning at seven o'clock.

THE death took place at Covehead on Monday of one most highly respected residents of that section in the person of the late John K. Bearisto whose demise has removed from this earthly sphere a man highly esteemed by all with whom he was acquainted. Mr. Bearisto had been ill for the past year of Bright's disease. His death has caused a vacancy in his Presbyterian Church of which he was a consistent member. He leaves to mourn a family of five, W. K. at Sydney, George at home, James in Chicago, Miss Ellen in Boston and Mrs. Fred White, North River, to all of which besides a sorrowing widow, The Guardian extends its sincerest sympathy.

THE body of John J. Kelly, son of Charles Kelly, who was killed in Berlin New Hampshire, came over to Georgetown by the Minto Saturday and were forwarded to his home Peake's Station for interment. The deceased, who went away last November was employed in the lumber woods and on Tuesday last while working among the logs some of them fell on him, causing his death. He was a young man 22 years of age, and his sudden death—under such circumstances has cast a gloom over the community which he had spent his boyhood. His funeral which took place Sunday afternoon from his late home Peake's Station was very largely attended.

A VERY pleasant home social under the auspices of Victoria Division S O T was held last night at the residence of John A Lawson. There was a large attendance and the evening was a most enjoyable one. The chair was occupied by L. W. Harris and an excellent program consisting of vocal and instrumental music, readings, speeches, etc., was given. After a cordial vote of thanks to the genial host and hostess Mr. and Mrs. Lawson, and others the company broke up after one of the most pleasant gatherings held in the City for some time.

THE Captain of the Stanley writing the agent of Marine and Fisheries on Monday says that there has been no more in the ice since the Stanley was stuck, and the prospects are not good for the future. Even if she were loose, it would not be possible to cross, as the straits are at present full of heavy, packed and rafted ice. The only open water was visible on Friday, a slit about 30 feet wide along the edge of the board ice. The steamer has been cut out of her icy bed and the ice around her is 14 feet deep. Her port side is badly dented by the squeezing received on the 13th.
