PRESENTING NELSON BUST

ST. JOHN, N. B., Oct. 22.—Rev. Alfred Hall, of Toronto, arrived in the city yesterday. Mr. Hall is known from one end of the dominion to the other, in connection with the distribution of the Nelson shields which have done more than any other agency to perpetuate the memory of Nelson's famous victory.

During a recent visit to Fredericton Mr. Hall presented to the government a bust of Lord Nelson, made from the metal from the "Victory," the formal presentation of which will be made later when the legislature is in session, when it will be placed in the legislative building. From St. John he goes to Nova Scotia on a similar errand, and on Wednesday next he will present one of the busts to the legislature in Halifax.

From Halifax he will go to Sydney to visit the Ross Sailors' Hospital and the sailor's institution in North Sydney. Later he will visit Charlottetown for the purpose of arranging the presentation of a Nelson bust to the Prince Edward Island provincial legislature.

PATRIOTIC SUNDAY IN THE CITY CHURCHES

Every man who enlists now can do so with a clear conscience. England went into the struggle only because she was compelled to, but when she did decide it was without any misgivings. On the sixth day of August, 1914, Mr. Asquith said in the House of Commons: "I do not believe that any nation ever entered into a great controversy—and this is one of the greatest history will ever know—with a clearer conscience and stronger conviction that it is fighting not for aggression, not for the maintenance of its own selfish interest, but in the defence of principles, the maintenance of which is vital to the civilization of the world." It is a great thing to have a part in this struggle for such noble ends. Every man who enlists under the British flag has a clear conscience. He is fighting in a righteous cause. He is battling against the continuation of war in the world. He is helping to bring in a better day wherein righteousness shall more fully dwell on the earth. It is worth while enlisting in such a cause.

The man who enlists shows his patriotism in a practical manner. The British Government is the most enlightened in the world. I heard a missionary from India say recently at the Maritime Baptist Convention in Truro, "Thank God for the British Government in India. They could not be missionary work in India without the British Government." Our King calls us and we show our loyalty as we respond. If we can go we should go, and now is the time when our help may count most. Our God, our King and our Country call us.

What about the response? When Moses called, the Levites immediately answered. They gathered under his standard against the rebellious people and a great victory was gained that day. That will be the way with the Allies if the response is right.

Think for a moment what the response has been so far in the British Empire. When word was flashed around the world that war had broken out between England and Germany Britishers rushed to the colors. They came from New Zealand, Australia, India, Canada and Newfoundland. In South Africa the Boers showed their loyalty by taking the greater part of German possession in Africa. The Kaiser sneered at England's "conventional army," but he found out their metal when he is making 3,000,000 more and he will get them. The response has been voluntary thus far and it is little short of marvellous. We have come to a very serious emergency now and yet we have the confidence of our King will not be misplaced and he is not disappointed in his subjects who in the darkest moments have shown their sternest resolve. It is for each one of us to say what our response shall be.

One thing that has struck me about these men who have enlisted is that under the most of them regard it as the call of God to them. A mother asked me recently what she should do about answering her son who wanted to enlist and who was only waiting for her consent. The only answer that could be given was "Do you say no if he believes God wants him to fight the battles for righteousness." A father told me a few months ago that his son came to him and told him he wanted to go to the war. That father said, "Son, I cannot spare you from the farm. The boy went back to his work, but was listless and unhappy. After two months he came to his father again and said, 'Father I must go. God is calling me.' That young man had the call of God to fight for the Empire as much as I have the call of God to preach the Gospel. That is true of the young men who have enlisted. They are a noble lot of men that have responded after careful and serious thought. It is the call of God that is ringing in their ears.

One thing more and I am done. Those young men who have volunteered have placed themselves where they can make more of their lives than

if they stayed at home. In the city of Florence one of the treasures of art admired by thousands of visitors is Michael Angelo's representation in marble of young David. The shepherd boy stands with firm bold, the stone grasped tightly in his right hand, ready to speed on his holy errand of crushing the tyrant. When the statue was unveiled 350 years ago it caused an unparalleled sensation among the young of art. It is indeed a marvellous piece of sculpture. But the strange thing about that statue is that the stone was a second chance. A sculptor began work on a noble piece of stone but he hacked and mangled the block. It was abandoned as worthless, and thrown into the back yard. For years it lay there blackened and soiled until Michael Angelo found it. He saw its possibilities. Under his skillful touch the statue of David appeared. In like manner God is transforming some of these soldier boys who in the home land seemed to have little to do in the war they have shown themselves to be heroes. We underestimated them, but God gave them a second chance. These soldiers of ours are a noble lot, and Jesus Christ is giving them another chance to make the most of themselves by their enlistment. I do not say that going to the war is all that God requires of a man for his salvation, but I do say that a man who has made the great sacrifice of offering himself to his country in its hour of need is not far from the Kingdom. He can be easily touched by the Spirit of God in the trenches or on the battlefield. It is not a hard task for him to make a personal surrender to Jesus Christ after he has surrendered to His call for enlistment.

The call of God and King and Empire is louder to-day than it has been since this war began. It is for men voluntarily to decide what their duty is at this crisis in the history of the British Empire.

RUSSIA'S NAVY

FOOD CONSUMPTION

That men eat five per cent. or six per cent. more than women—not because they are gluttons, but because they actually require that much more nourishment—appears as the result of an investigation made in the nutrition laboratory of the Carnegie Institute at Washington, U. S. The reason for the discrepancy seems to be that women have a smaller proportion of active tissue than men of the same weight, and more inactive material, such as fat. The American investigation disclosed that the average woman generates only 1355 heat units in the twenty four hours or about two per cent. more for the latter per pound of body weight. When groups were compared, after careful selection of individuals of nearly the same height and weight, the men were found to produce about twelve per cent. more heat than the women. The investigators rigorously excluded athletes from their comparisons, dealing only with non-athletic men and women of the same height and the same weight.
