HINTS FOR The Motorist

CONSERVING THIRTY CENT GAS

When purchased with a fifty cent dollar, fifteen cent gasoline naturally costs thirty cents per gallon and those unfortunate motorists who are not receiving twice as many of the fifty cent as they formerly did of the one hundred cent coins of the realm are seeking after fuel economy. Here are a few suggestions along this line: Be sure that each cylinder is as gas tight as possible, in other words that the compression is perfect. Use a carburetor with a dash adjustment and keep it set as lean as will give good power. Keep the engine free from carbon, run the spark as early as it can be and not cause knocking. Provide lots of heat for the intake, even though it may reduce maximum power a trifle. If there ever is a smell of raw gasoline around the car, examine the whole fuel system for leaks. Run the circulating water just as hot as possible short of making it boil and cover the radiator when the car is standing in summer as well as in winter. Use the best engine oil obtainable and lubricate all moving parts conscientiously at all times. Do not idle the engine, but shut down and use the starter, even for very short stops. Keep the tires well inflated, for soft tires absorb much power as well as ruining themselves. Don't let the muffler become choked or the valves out of time. Push the car about on the garage floor occasionally and see that nothing is dragging. Avoid slipping the clutch and racing the engine and don't try to accelerate too rapidly.

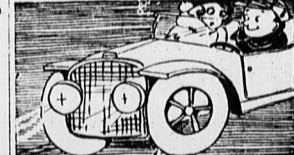
RADIATOR AND TIRE QUESTIONS

A. G. H. asks: Is there any way of tightening a tubular radiator, which leaks, without tearing it to pieces? Will the stuff that is sold to stop radiator leaks, be likely to interfere with the circulation? What is the best material to coat rims with to keep them from rusting? Why is it necessary to use talcum powder on inner tubes?

Answer: Thick white lead, applied to the leak, will harden and stop it temporarily, but it is necessary to solder the crack in a tube to make a permanent repair. To get at the damaged part of the tube, it is generally necessary to cut away the sheet metal fins surrounding it and the job can seldom be done without dismantling the radiator. Radiator cements are not likely to stop the circulation, but they may coat the inside surfaces and thus reduce the radiator's effectiveness. Flake graphite, stirred into gasoline, applied with a brush and rubbed into the surface of the metal, is as good as anything. Talcum powder serves to prevent the tube from sticking to the casing and rim and to reduce the chafing, which occurs between these parts.

ACCELERATOR FOOTREST

W. La C. writes: I cannot get used to the foot-throttle of the car that I am now driving enough to prevent sudden changes of power whenever a "bump" occurs. What is the best way of overcoming this trouble?

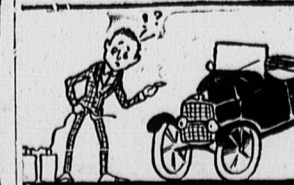


Answer: Some accelerators are very awkward to operate, but one can become used to almost anything of this kind, by long experience. Sometimes a footrest may prove of help to the operator and adjustable accelerator footrests of very neat design, are on the market. Any attachment to the foot board that gives support to the foot against involuntary movement without interfering with intentional motion, is of value. A properly shaped and located block, fixed to the floorboard, such as you can make yourself, may help to solve the problem and we suggest that you experiment on these lines.

MAGNETO RECHARGING

N. K. asks: Can a Ford magneto be recharged with current from a number of dry-cells? How do you set the magneto when the current is applied?

Answer: It would be impracticable to try to get together enough



dry-cells to furnish the necessary current, especially as storage batteries are readily available. Four or five five volt vehicle batteries are sufficient to give good results. To bring a magnet pole exactly in line with a magneto-coil, draw a straight line from the magneto contact-post to the rear, over the transmission case parallel to the axis of the car and place a compass with its needle pivot one inch to the left of this line and about six inches back of the post. Then crank over the engine until the compass needle points parallel to the line.

Sunday School Lesson

MAY 30—JONATHAN AND HIS ARMORBEARER

Lesson—1 Sam. 14 1-46. Printed Text—1 Sam. 14: 1-13.

Golden Text—"Be strong and of good courage." (Josh. 1:6).

Historical Setting.

Time.—1085 B. C. Place.—Between Michmash and Gibeath.

Daily Readings.

Monday, May 24—Enemies of Israel (1 Sam. 13: 1-7.) Tuesday, May 25.—Jonathan and his Armorbearer (1 Sam. 14: 1-13.) Wednesday, May 26.—Israel Delivered (1 Sam. 14: 15-23.) Thursday, May 27.—Saul Victorious (1 Sam. 14: 27-47.) Friday, May 28.—God Our Defense (P. s. 6. 2.) Saturday, May 29.—Rejoicing in Trials (1 Pet. 4:1-14.) Sunday, May 30.—Overcoming (1 John 2: 13-20.)

Setting.—Saul, formally chosen king, is despised by some, but his victory over the Ammonites captures the popular imagination, and the "kingdom is renewed" under constitutional guarantees, and with wise counsel from Samuel, Saul's son, Jonathan, attacks a Philistine garrison, setting the Philistines to invade with a mighty host. Saul, with an infinitesimal force, confronts them near the pass of Michmash, seven and one-half miles N. by E. from Jerusalem. Now comes a piece of "derring-do," fit to stir any blood. Fully as courageous are many later examples of initiative in Christian work.

Comments

Verse 1.—Approximately seven years have gone by since the last lesson. Read intervening chapters for events. Michmash was seven miles north of Jerusalem. Jonathan was a young man when his father became king, and was famed for his courage. A great chasm separated the camp of Israel from that of the Philistines. Crossing over was too hazardous an undertaking to meet with Saul's approval.

Verse 2.—The location of this Gibeath has not been definitely decided upon. "The people that were with Saul were his bodyguard."

Verse 3.—The identity of all these characters except Eli seems to be uncertain. The ephod was the high priest's shoulder dress, upon which were fastened the "Urim and Thummim."

Verse 4, 5.—These passes were ravines running down into, across and out of the valley.

Verse 6.—This exploit, though contrary to military discipline, "is one of the most gallant that history or romance records." The word "uncircumcised" expresses contempt for the Philistines.

Verse 7.—These words are the words of a friend, rather than a servant. This picture of Jonathan, together with that of his friendship for David, shows a rare native charm of personality. He was a comrade of, rather than a lord over, his servant.

Verse 8.—Jonathan's plan was daring.

Verse 9.—Jonathan had no doubt that he would be victorious. Confidence means much.

Verse 10.—The secret of Jonathan's courage seems to have been his faith in Israel's God as against the deities of the Philistines. Ordinarily such a challenge would have meant certain death.

Verse 11.—It would scarcely occur to the Philistines of the garrison that these two men had come alone and with hostile intent.

Verse 12.—The expression "come up to us and we will show you a thing" was used in contempt. On the part of Jonathan and his armor bearer, it was a display of sublime audacity.

Practical Points.


In this generous, princely, valiant youth we see what the Christian warrior should be and how he should act.

- 1.—He is armed and prepared.—Jonathan did not rush into battle without equipment. He wore armor and had weapons. Eph. 6. 10-18 tells us of our preparation.
- 2.—He has a fellow soldier and helper who is inspired by his example.—Study the story of Paul, his consummate soldier, and note his companions and helpers on each missionary journey.
- 3.—He seeks for divine guidance.—He is quick to find and recognize God's will, even in seemingly trifling tokens (verses 8-10). So David listened for "the sound of marching" at the moment for victory (2 Sam. 5. 23, 24.).
- 4.—He is prompt and energetic.—Every faculty of his being is complete (verses 11-13) to take advantage of opportunities, secreted; awake and watchful for seasons that God is on his side.
- 5.—He has the spirit of leadership, inspiring others to follow.—Jonathan's initiative led an army into the fray and won a decisive victory. People are eager to follow the true hero and under his leadership will achieve success.

WEEDS ARE ROBBERS

Weeds are robbers because they steal plant food and soil moisture away from the crops and thus reduce crop yields. Good crops and weeds cannot grow together. To keep the farm free from weeds, few methods give such good results as a systematic rotation of crops with regular seeding down to grass and clover with every three or four years.

The best time to destroy weeds is when they start growth. Harrowing or cultivation at this period is fatal to young weeds. Later they must be cut off with the cultivator or hoe or pulled by hand. Not even a few weeds should be allowed to develop seed, for each mature weed will bear anywhere from a few hundred to several thousand seeds, each of which may produce a new weed next year. It is well to encourage the germination of any weed seed that may remain in the soil. The only way to clear foul banks of weeds is to sprout the seed and then kill the young weeds. Early plowing and frequent cultivation will accomplish this result.
