A GEOLOGICAL MYSTERY.—A gentleman who recently had the pleasure of visiting the hospitable home of Mr. and Mrs. John M. McDonald of Dundee, this province informs The Guardian that on Mr. McDonald's farm there is a subterranean cave of peculiar if not mysterious formation. When the original owners of this farm settled on it about 75 years ago they found in one of the fields a peculiar depression about 20 feet square. During the following years in the process of clearing the land all the stones and stumps in the neighboring fields were thrown into this depression only to gradually disappear. 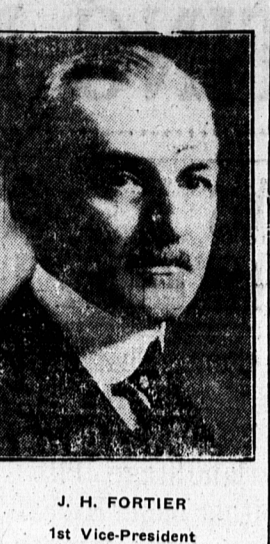

THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, June 2.—The foreign demand for Canadian grain on the Montreal market today was not very large and in consequence the trade was inactive. Exporter-made sales of No. 4 grade barley to Bristol at 36s 3d per quarter to June shipment, and No. 1 feed oats were also worked. There was a little more business done in the domestic market, including sales of No. 1 barley at 6 1/2 cents per bushel over the July option and No. 2 feed oats at 2 1/2 cents per bushel over the same option, c.i.f. Montreal, New York was in the market for feed barley and bid ninety cents per bushel c.i.f. with seller, asking 92 cents per bushel, c.i.f. The local trade in car lots of oats was inactive and prices were unchanged. In sympathy with the continued weakness in the cash wheat situation at Winnipeg, a somewhat unsettled feeling developed in the local spring wheat flour market and millers in some instances reduced their prices, but most of them continued to quote at yesterday's values. The volume of business showed no improvement. There was a new development in the market for winter wheat flour, the demand being still of a very limited character for supplies, and in consequence the movement was small. The feed was about steady and prices were unchanged. A fairly active trade was done in all lines of milled and the tone of the market was firm. The trade in standard grades of rolled was active and prices steady. The volume of business in eggs was moderate and prices were unchanged. Considerable trade was done in butter and the tendency was firm. The cheese market was extremely dull.

OTTAWA, Ont., (Eggs)—The general situation is firm at the recent advance cable offers are being received from Great Britain at 17c per 10 dozen c.i.f. this is about 42 cents per dozen delivered, Canadian exporters are meeting this with counter offers of 19. This is about 15 1/2 cents per dozen delivered. No export business has been reported to date this season. Toronto and Montreal markets firm and unchanged. Winnipeg jobbing extras 32, firsts 30, seconds 27, Saskatchewan, jobbing prices extras 28 firsts 25 to 27 seconds 22 to 24, Alberta, jobbing extras 32 to 35, firsts 28 to 30, seconds 23 to 25, British Columbia, unchanged.
