Russians And Albania

In Russia's activities, Russia is said to be taking the side of Turkey in Angora's squabble with Great Britain over the Mesopotamian frontier, with the great Mosul oil fields as the prize.

The Balkans never feel safe when Turkey seems at all aggressive, and now they fear joint action by Angora and Moscow. For this the Albanian alliance would be important.

Albania, though small, is enabled by her position to harass her neighbors, and the other Balkan states feel that her alliance with Russia is an alliance with Turkey as well.

Alliance Concluded.

The new Russian alliance was concluded at the Soviet embassy in Rome, when Premier Fannoff, of Albania, exchanged recognition notes with Ambassador Yurienoff, of Russia. Moscow immediately sent diplomatic documents and a representative to the Albanian capital, Tirana.

If the Balkan fears that this means Albanian aid for Turkey in time of need are well founded, the situation now insures Turkey against Balkan attacks on her European territory should she be busy elsewhere.

Prince Edward Island Foxes For England

(Canadian Press.)

MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 24.—In addition to the usual passenger list on the S. S. Montcalm which left port yesterday for Liverpool there was also on board forty live silver foxes bound for the village of Little Baldon, Oxfordshire, England. These valuable little animals, which have been shipped from one of the largest silver fox farms in Prince Edward Island, travelled up from Charlottetown, P. E. I. to Montreal on the Maritime Express of the C. N. R. and were immediately put aboard the liner under the personal care of a special representative of the Express Department of the C. N. R. who has complete charge of the shipment from Prince Edward Island to Oxfordshire.

Upon their arrival at Liverpool the foxes will be taken ashore at the Princess landing stage immediately after the passengers have landed and will proceed to their destination by the same boat train going to London where quick connections will be made for the final leg of their journey to Little Baldon.

Price of Hogs Drops in Chicago

CHICAGO, Oct. 24.—With demand so slow that more than 30,000 hogs were left unsold today at the Union Stock Yards, closing prices on hogs were \$1.50 to \$2.00 lower than last week. This is one of the most severe price declines in years.

The bulk of the hogs sold in Chicago today brought around \$9.25. Many sold around \$9.00.

Everett C. Brown, President of the Chicago Livestock Exchange said that commission men were urgently advising the holding back of pig and hog shipments during the remainder of the week. He predicted a sharp reaction from the break in prices if the country shippers would do this.

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Capt. Read's Letter To Commissioners

The following is the letter of Captain John L. Read submitted in evidence to the Railway Commissioners at the recent sitting in Charlottetown:

R. W. Simpson, Esq., Assistant General Manager, C. N. R.

Dear Sir, Owing to the weather conditions I will not be able to attend the meeting of the Board of Trade, but will give you the facts as near as possible, and I herewith enclose a summary from the Log of the Ferry.

These are the actual times and the time of sunset is taken for the 15th of each month which is the mean.

There is considerable extra risk attached to overnight navigation, and especially in the Fall of the year, after the gas and bell buoy is taken up and before the Board forms to cover the reefs.

This has been contradicted several times but not by anyone who knows anything about navigation.

There is now a suggestion being put forth, to do away with night navigation, but it is not sound on the face of it, for the suggestion is that we return to Tormentine and lay there, but the only trouble with the suggestion is that it is dark before we can possibly get ready to start back, and to make matters worse we would have to make the trip from Tormentine before daylight, which is the darkest part of the night.

By referring to this summary you will find the sun sets in November at 4.29 p. m. which means we could not be ready to leave there at 5.02 p. m.

In December the sun sets at 4.16 p. m. and it was 4.34 p. m. before we even got there and would be at least 5.30 before we could get away.

And the same is true of every other month in the winter. This trip would have to be made after dark and the one in the morning BEFORE daylight.

If cost has any bearing on the subject, I would point out that during the winter season we can make a trip in about the same time after dark as in the daylight, but with ice it is a different matter altogether, for it is impossible to pick out the leads at night and during

leave Borden in the morning and go to Tormentine and then make two round trips with freight and return with the passengers and loads and then go right back with another freight trip without any lost time, but with the double passenger service, we go to Tormentine and can only make one round freight trip because there is not time enough to make two as we have a passenger connection to make on the return after 42 train and when we do arrive at Tormentine around 6 p. m. we have to lay idle for an hour and a half waiting for the evening train, whereas we could make a round trip of freight in two hours. In other words, we leave at 11.30 hours and a half of daylight waiting for the passenger train that we could use in handling freight and last November we carried as many potatoes alone as we did in the other ten months excepting October.
