HOCKEY.—One of the best games of the season was played in Morell Rink on Friday night, March 14th when the St. Peter's "Pioneers" scored even with Morell "Dreadnaughts" in a well contested match. The game for the first two periods was fast and clean, showing good work by each individual of the respective teams. At the close of the first period the score stood 4-2 and at the close of the second 6-4 in favour of St. Peter's. There was fine individual work by Rattray, Murphy, Gillis, Lewis and Anderson with Quigley as steady as ever as point. Rattray literally bombarded the Morell goal watcher but the strong defence of the home team turned back many well directed shots. The last period was fast and rough the "Dreadnaught" playing the man too much instead of the puck, a fact which mars the sport for spectators and players alike. Although no penalties were handed out it was felt by all present that there was some very "dirty" work by the Morell boys in a vain effort to win. At the close of the game the score stood 7-7 thus leaving St. Peter's Pioneers the victors for the season having won two and tied one game out of the four games played. The count of goals too leaves the "Pioneers" fourteen points in the lead of their heavier opponents. There was the usual line up with Mr. Ronald McInnis referring and Mr. Bruce McEwen officiating as Judge of play.

SUDDEN DEATH.—The death occurred very suddenly at Montague, on Saturday, March 15th inst., of Mr. John J. McDonald, aged 76 years. Mr. Domyville, of Montague, and Mr. McEwen, of Orwell.

the next morning the city would be put under martial law, and the essential industries operated by the Federal Government.

The Strikers Cave in.

That broke the strike. The Mayor had the police and the soldiers, and the next day he operated the municipal street cars. Two other lines, privately owned, were able to follow suit, and when the strike leaders saw that they could not hold the car men, and fearing that they would be swiftly deserted, they called the strike off. The shipyard workers, did not get their increase in pay and all the honors were with the mayor, who, from the first, had refused to accept or acknowledge any of the concessions that the strike leaders, in the name of humanity, had offered the citizens, such as the burying of the dead, the operation of a limited telephone service, and so forth. A point to be remembered is that Mayor Hanson is a radical himself, and that the public ownership of one of the Seattle street railway systems was brought about by him. Therefore, when the strike was threatened there was some doubt as to his own sympathies. However, despite his Norwegian name and antecedents, he showed himself a hundred per cent. American, and his phrase, "The seat of city government is still at the City Hall," is one that will be remembered. Should the I.W.W. try it again, this will prove the I.H.S.

ANXIOUS TO REACH P. E. ISLAND.

The following letter has been received by Mrs. W. P. Dalton, from her brother, Pte. A. P. Griffin, of Glenarry, Lot 7:

Belgium.
Dear Sister,—With pleasure I now answer your ever welcome letter that I received. I was pleased indeed to hear from you, to know all were well at home, as this leaves me at present. Well, dear sister, the cruel war has terminated, thank God, and Liberty has emerged from the conflict triumphant. Could you but witness as I have the awful destruction of life and property, you would then more fully realize the meaning of that for which the Allies have been fighting. Liberty—the liberty of mankind, from the overbearing ever burdensome yolk of Prussianism. Now, dear sister, at the present time I am in Belgium, en route with the Canadian Corps for Germany. How long we shall be retained there is more than I know, but let us hope not long, as I so long to return to home and friends once again. I have not heard from brother Dan for oh, so long! I do not even know whether or no he weathered the storm, but at least I hope so. His division is not near us. We have had a long march to follow up Fritz's evacuation, and still a couple or three days on the road before we hit the Rhine. I wish it were Charlottetown. I had a letter today from Mrs. F. Butler, also her gift parcel, which was gratefully received. I also had a letter yesterday from B. McDonald, the first since leaving Canada. I wrote him several times, but I guess he never received my letters. I was pleased to hear from him, to know he is still living and going strong, surprised though at his long stay in the U. S. I was sorry to learn that the flu—as we call it over here, for we had our share—has been raging with such serious effect at home. It seems, according to reports to be prevalent all over Canada.
Well, dear sister, I have nothing that I can write you about, for our mail is as yet censored, so therefore I will close for this time, with best wishes to you and all enquiring friends. I remain, as ever,
