C. N. R. Oil Burning Engine Successful
 (Special to the Guardian)
 WINNIPEG, Nov. 3.—Running easily on its trial test schedule time No. 5520 one of the new oil electric cars recently put into service by the Canadian National Railways arrived in Winnipeg last night, thereby completing the first half of its transcontinental journey of 1,372 miles. The car was operated under its own power and not once did the engine stop running. Mr. D. Crombie, chief of transportation, who is in charge of the movement, expressed himself as satisfied with the showing made by the car to date. He pointed out

that the 2,937 mile trip to the coast was being made as an endurance test and that the performance already shown was most encouraging. From the time that the car left Montreal Sunday the greatest of interest was shown in the test trip by the various towns through which it passed. At Colesau Junction, Alexandria, North Bay and other towns crowds gathered at the station to await its arrival. Though Capreol was not reached until the early morning the platform was thronged when the car arrived. Only a five minute stop was made in Winnipeg after which the car proceeded on its run to Vancouver. Car No. 15829 is 69 feet long and will accommodate 57 passengers, having also a compartment for the handling of baggage and express. The engine is oil burning and this in turn operates an electric generator which provides the motive power. Upon arriving at the coast car will go into regular service as a local passenger train.

Early Snow Records In United States

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—October snow and frost are being experienced by a large portion of the Atlantic seaboard following similar conditions in the midwest. Early snow records were broken in Connecticut but heavier snow falls were reported in Washington and Virginia. An inch and a half in New Haven was the heaviest there in 52 years, but Washington and Northern Virginia had a two inch fall, the earliest since 1870.
