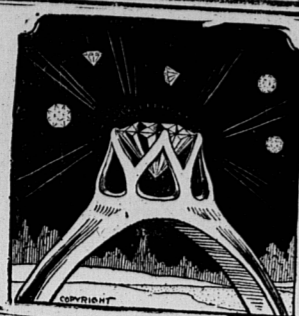

In the past they have built their speed boats with a double object in view, they were to be staunch and seaworthy and at the same time fast. Now they will build a purely speed boat, built along lines which tend to the greatest speed and sacrificing any other quality which might be desirable but equally unnecessary. The firm will be satisfied with nothing less than twenty-five miles per hour and will install a six cylinder engine. A craft of these pretensions will shorten the distance between two given points in a straight course in any harbor.

With many readers the past Xmas season has been such as to live long in their memory for one reason at least: presents received have been greater in numbers and in value than in other years. 'Thou shalt not kill.' is one of the Ten Commandments in Acadia and the Acadians observe the Commandments with religious obedience. It is one of the very few places in the world where there are no daily—farmers and fishermen are a rugged, honest, upright class of people and crime has never entered their small dominions. Judges and sheriffs are unknown. The parish priest combines all these offices with that of a policeman, headmaster, postmaster and pastor. Only three newspapers are read by the Acadians, L'Evangeline, printed in Yarmouth, N. S., Le Courrier Acadien, in New Brunswick, L'Impartial, in Prince Edward Island. They are all weeklies."

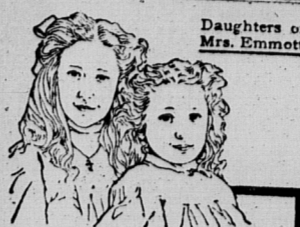

**NEGOTIATING AN ANGLO-AMERICAN PEACE PACT**

(Continued from page 1.)

President Taft's difficulties will come when he undertakes to secure the approval of the Senate for such a treaty. That body held before to permit the executive branch of the Government to approve the protocols or compromise to use the more precise word of diplomatic parlance, without subjecting them to the Senate, was clearly an attempt on the part of the executive branch to arrogate to itself treaty-making powers not contemplated by the Constitution, and in which, under the Constitution, the Senate must share.

Public sentiment has changed since that time, and there is not the indignant fear that the present Chief Executive will encroach on the powers of coordinate branches which was entertained by some, at least, with regard to President Roosevelt. Incidentally, the fact that no less a lawyer than Mr. Taft has determined to stand sponsor for such a convention is a somewhat striking vindication of ex-President Roosevelt and Secretary Hay.

The experience of former administrations does not afford much ground for optimism regarding the fate of the convention which President Taft and Secretary Knox propose to negotiate. Secretary Hay, with the cordial approval of President Roosevelt, negotiated seven general arbitration treaties with a group of the leading Powers of Europe. They were submitted to the Senate, where the question of constitutionality was promptly raised. Mr. Roosevelt made every possible effort to secure

their ratification in such form as would at least preclude their virtual emasculation, but without availing themselves of the chairman of the Committee on Foreign Relations, which he declared that with the proposed amendment on Foreign Relations, amendment "we would have a treaty every case where arbitration was sought under a general treaty" a special treaty defining clearly the matter in dispute, the scope of the powers of the arbitrators and the arbitral tribunal and the several stages of the procedure" must be negotiated, and such a treaty would, of course, have to be submitted to the Senate. In effect this meant that all the usual processes of negotiation and treaty-making must be employed before any important question could be submitted to arbitration.
