A SLUMP IN THE LUMBER MARKET.—A former Islander, on a visit here from the lumber district of B.C., reports a decline of fifty per cent in lumber. Cedar shingles which formerly sold at eight dollars and fifty cents per thousand are now selling for four dollars, and other lumber in proportion. N. S. and N. B. Lumber is also on the downward tendency. Many of the fir trees have gone to waste on P.E.I. the last four or five years, on account of a disease which caused them to decay. Thousands of dollars have been lost by the owners neglecting to use or sell them before they went bad. Most of them are now of little use.

A TIMELY RESCUE.—But for the timely action of Mr. George V. Moore, Mr. Russel Binns a well known carpenter of this city would probably have met his death by drowning on Monday evening. Mr. Binns was out with some companions in a motor boat and accidentally fell overboard from a deck-chair, some little time elapsing before the accident was noticed. Mr. Moore who was in the boat happened to notice that some thing was wrong hastened to the spot off Rickard's wharf in his little motor boat where the boat in which Mr. Binns had been was circling around in an endeavour to get near him. Mr. Moore managed to get a grip on the struggling man's collar and held him until assistance arrived. Mr. Binns was thoroughly exhausted when rescued and had about given up all hope of being saved.

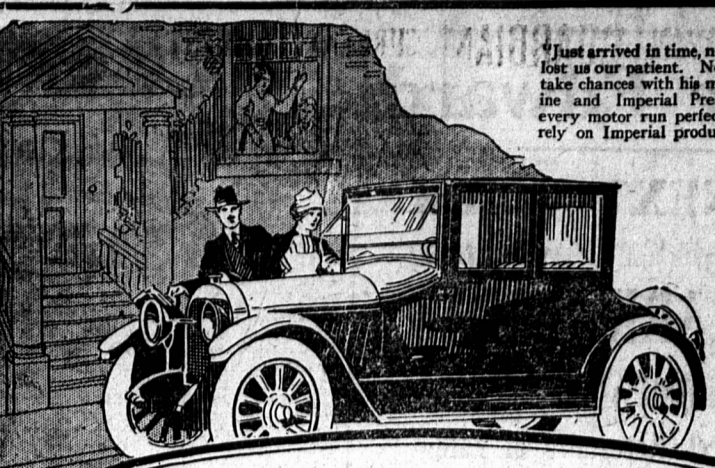

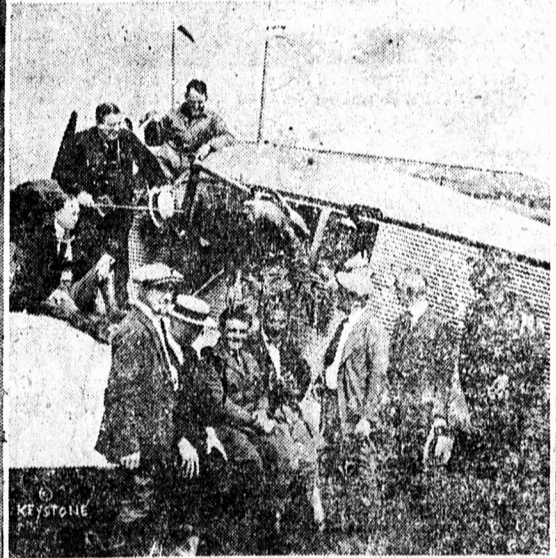

Saturday, September 4th, will be a memorable one for Halifax as well as for the Halifax Shipyards, Ltd., as shortly before noon the first steel steamship was successfully launched. Thousands of people witnessed the spectacle from every vantage point, both inside and outside the Shipyards premises, and from the Dartmouth shore. The company has overcome many difficulties in completing its first steamer. 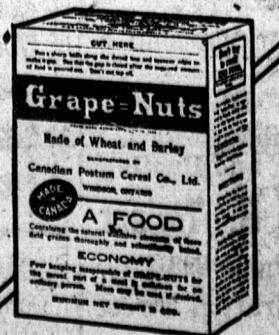
