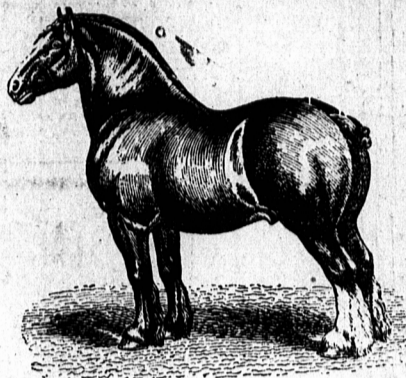

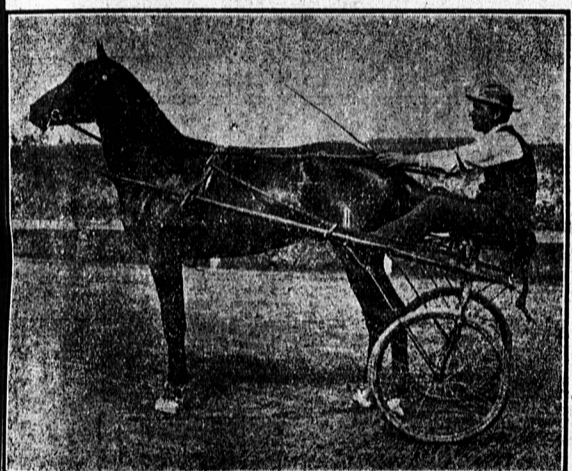
LORD DALMENY

George Cresceus (2 yrs) 2.48-4

Nothing about the great Cresceus King of trotters and Sire of George Cresceus the first place there is the fact that Cresceus is Cresceus. His mare name, when full in balance, outweighs those of all the other trotting stallions whose name the golden tongue has uttered. His deeds, his achievements—they are household words wherever the speed is known or prized. The gap that separates him from all others of his gift and also wide that it is, in very truth, the case of "Eclipse first and the rest nowhere," over him. It is unnecessary to stop and enumerate his long list of world's records. Everybody knows them by heart. For one great thing that any other trotting stallion has ever done, he shows a dozen greater. His crown is thickly gilded with stars, but one of which would be sufficient to confer celebrity on any other horse. The big share of the stake went to the chestnut colt from Charlottetown George Cresceus 42246 the champion trotting stallion of the world, and George bears a MARKED RESEMBLANCE to his noted sire. "The Cresceus Colt had the speed of the quartette. The race colts speed again gave him the lead." The Halifax Chronicle Oct. 18, 1907. For the second heat there was nothing to it but the Fredrickson mare and the Cresceus colt. The SUPERIOR BREEDING seemed to tell in the two final heats which he won in rather easy style. The Halifax Herald Oct. 18, 1907.

At Charlottetown against a field of six Commodore trotters and sires (half mile heats) he beat the whole field by many lengths, except the racer Arena Bell which he forced to go to the wire in 1.20 in the half mile heat.
