An evening of rare enjoyment is promised all who attend the Gibson Pictures in the Opera House on March 3rd. The pictures will be correctly set off by a number of young ladies and gentlemen of this city. The plan opens this morning at the usual places.

SPREADING the snow blockade on the C. P. R.; through N. B., an exchange relay through such as used before when superintendent of the road, was in the west. This carries a large shield in front and a number of knives which, as the plough is sent into a snow bank, revolve and, catching up the snow, send it into a large funnel. Through this it is ejected and with such force and effect that he has known such a plough to throw the snow from the track over the rocky side of a cutting 100 feet high. The funnel can be trained in any direction. A gang of shorellers precede the plough and shovel the snow from the sides of the cutting on to the track. Then the plough is sent into the pile at a speed of some seven or eight miles an hour and away goes the "beautiful." The plough is now on the way to N. B. clearing the cuts on this division as it comes. Such a device is needed in Prince Edward Island.

BEAUTIFUL pictures, sent out for advertising purposes, are frequently marred by unsightly type which makes the picture useless to the recipient for any thing but merely transient purposes. A LATE issue of Collier's Weekly has the following on Prince Edward Island: Modern Machinery has made it possible to manufacture peat into the cheapest, cleanest, and in many respects the most suitable fuel known. It has none of the disadvantages of soft coal, and it has the heating power of hard coal. These facts being well established, it is time some enterprising capitalists stepped in with such a product as this and stood midway between the arrogant operators of the anthracite mines and the lumber men who, because of a lax forestry department, both in the Dominion and the United States, have been allowed to deplete the timber lands of both countries. Farmers in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick are now burning coal, a thing that two years ago was unheard of. The geological formation of Prince Edward Island is such that mining of any kind is practically impossible. There is, however, a valuable surface deposit of peat which, if properly developed, could be made of great value to the promoters, because it would yield a product that would be indispensable to not only the farmers of the island, but to those of the adjacent provinces as well. And not only a more extensive trade could be built up. The financiers of the island, who are investing in foreign concerns and loaning money to promote commercial enterprises that can not help their own people, now have the rare chance to build up an industry that will not only enrich themselves but materially advance the interests of their province and their people.

"I'm afraid potatoes are going to sell at a remarkably small price before long," said a retailer grocer recently. In answer to an inquiry as to his reason for such an opinion the gentleman referred to said that today lots of fine quality potatoes sold at the market for 90 cents per barrel. Heretofore there had been quite a market for New Brunswick potatoes in the American Markets—particularly New York and Boston. This year the American crop is so good that it is doubtful if it will be necessary for Uncle Sam to import any potatoes whatever. This leaves Toronto as practically the only market to which many potatoes will be exported.—Fredericton Gleaner.
