

Hawks Defeat Arrows To Square Semi-Finals

HALIFAX, Feb. 21 (CP)—Wingman Joe Fitzpatrick conducted Moncton Hawks to a 7-5 victory over Dartmouth Arrows tonight to square the Maritime Senior Hockey League semi-final at three games apiece. Deciding game in the best-of-seven series will be played Wednesday at Moncton.

Fitzpatrick shot three goals, one in each period, and set up two others. His play with John (Kink) McDonald gave Arrows a lesson in the fine art of passing the puck.

Hawks won the first two games of the series here and Arrows began keeping a weather eye out for Fitzpatrick. In winning the next three games, they rather lost sight of the fleet winger. Tonight it cost Arrows the game and possibly the series.

The game started slowly but picked up speed as it went along. A crowd of 5,693 liked the fast play in the second and third periods — though not the way the scoring went.

Thirteen penalties were given. Hawk goalie Al Tomari, who had 14 stops to Ken Dargavel's 24, was handed a minor in the second period for charging Alex Robertson. Robertson had taken a whack at

Tomari's fingers as he held the puck. Lou Milani tried a penalty shot but Tomari blocked it easily.

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The following is some recent comment by Bill (Ottawa Journal) Estwick, concerning the present World Hockey Tournament, which has just taken place in Europe, which might be of interest to local fans who have been following the progress of the Canadian entry, the Sudbury Wolves, and wondering too just, what the situation over there is all about.

"It still might be a bet that this World Hockey Tournament will wind up before the United Nations. And if UN officials are at all smart, they'll duck the issue right now. They may think they have a hot potato on their hands in the Berlin issue and other assorted international complications, but they've been enjoying something of a cinch compared with what they might have to handle if ever UN has international hockey developments referred to it.

"When you come to think of it there isn't a great deal of difference in the long run between the political problems of UN and national athletic events as the World Hockey Tournament. They stem from the same inability to see eye to eye on the political developments on the one hand and the rules of international sport on the other.

"Practically every person with experience in a World Hockey Tournament will tell you the same thing — that any similarity noted in the conception of hockey in Canada and at one of these tournaments is purely accidental. What is a legitimate play to a Canadian hockey player is regarded as a misdemeanor of horrifying proportions to an opponent or referee over there. There is emphasis placed on particular phases or incidents in the game that would probably go unnoticed here.

"What is the solution? That's anyone's guess, but from what has transpired time after time in these international hockey tournaments we'd suggest: it was a good time for Canada to pull out of them for good. Based on the interest shown in the selection of what is supposed to be representative Canadian teams — and the response we'd say so that it would occasion no disappointment.

LONDON, Feb. 21 (CP)—Solly Cantor of Toronto tonight outpointed Peter Fallon of Birkbehead in a fiery eight-round lightweight boxing bout.

The verdict was, unpopular with the 7,000 fans in London's Albert Hall.

It was Cantor's third and toughest fight — he has won them all — since he arrived in England last November. He said afterwards he felt sluggish and was not able to get going.

After the first two rounds in which Fallon landed some hard body punches, Cantor proceeded to give a polished display of ring craft.

Cantor weighed 136, Fallon 136½.

MONTEAL, Feb. 21 (CP)—Laurent Dauthuille of France tonight won his fourth straight fight in North America when he scored a unanimous 10-round decision over the veteran Jake Lamotta before a capacity crowd of 14,000 in Montreal's Forum.
