DEDICATION OF THE NEW CHURCH RECENTLY BUILT AT CORNWALL

Large Attendances Through Day—Rev. J. J. Teasdale, Frederickton Preaches in the Morning, Rev. T. F. Fullerton in the Afternoon, Rev. J. L. Miner in Evening.

The dedication of the new Methodist Church at Cornwall yesterday drew the largest attendances in the history of the congregation. The day was disagreeable from the surrounding country as well as the city hundreds of persons were present. In the morning the sermon was preached by Rev. J. J. Teasdale, Frederickton, formerly pastor of the First Methodist Church in this city and many of his former congregations were present to listen to him once more. The reverend gentleman spoke with all his old time vigor, and his sermon was a powerful presentation of truth.



NEW METHODIST CHURCH AT CORNWALL.

The following is a synopsis: Acts 2-1, 11, 12, 13, The healing of the blind man at the Gate Beautiful. Allusion was made by the preacher to the circumstances in relation to the noted miracle of the healing of the lame man. The position occupied by Peter and John and their endowment of power qualifying them for the blessed work in which they were engaged. He stated that the lame man is still with us and at the gate beautiful, for is it not true that the prodigal, the man that is out of the way, the thriftless, the morally infirm are

close to the University and the Church. Here the religion of Jesus matches it self against the forces of evil. Miracles are but signs of God's purpose and glory. His son. It is thus we must see God. Jesus taught his disciples that they were to see in him the Father's love, power and sympathy.

1. Men are the vehicles of God's thought and inspiration. Not only in the past but at the present, David in the writing the twenty third Psalm, and Tennyson's "In Memoriam." Beethoven in his wonderful symphonies, Isa in his wonderful vision and John Ruskin in his "Wild Crown of Olives." "Seven Lamps of Architecture" Ezra and Nehemiah in their work of reform and Luther, Wesley and Whitfield in the overthrow of wrong and colossal iniquities.

2. The disciples, Peter and John honored God by giving him the glory. They acknowledged God's power in the healing

of the lame man and the glorifying of Jesus. There is danger of the church and of the minister taking glory which belongs to another. We believe in the greatness and dignity of man said the preacher and the wonderful power conferred upon him is but the bestowment of gifts. We are inclined to

In the afternoon at 3 p. m. Rev. T. F. Fullerton preached an eloquent sermon to a large audience on "Increased opportunities."

At the evening service Rev. Johnson H. Miner of the Prince Street Baptist Church was the speaker and his discourse was listened to with pleasure.

HARCOURT CALLED TO ORDER.
LONDON, Oct. 18.—(Special)—Temperament has not fallen yet in the British Parliament, Harcourt was repeatedly called to order in Friday's debate and finally was rebuked by the chairman although he protested that was soliciting an explanation.

The Government benches enjoyed Harcourt's discomfiture and the Liberals bitterly resented it. The Liberals are united on fighting all issues and the education bill is being fought word by word.

THE FEELING IS CURRENT THAT RUSSIA IS PREPARING A COUP

Something Big Behind the Dardanelles Question—Sultan of Turkey Also Said to have a Bombshell—Will Beat the Record of Deceptions Practiced by Various Statesmen.

VIENNA, Oct. 17.—The report that Turkey is willing to declare the Dardanelles open for Russia and closed for all the other nations has excited attention here. It is possible for Turkey to take action in accordance with that policy without making a declaration. The whole situation in Eastern Europe supports the view that Russia is preparing some great coup for the present or the near future. But Austria and Germany expect that the raising of the Dardanelles question will be part of the scheme. In fact, Austria and Germany, with their ally Roumania, are desirous of raising the question themselves in order that Russia will not have an opportunity for springing an arrangement upon the powers at a time most convenient to herself and inconvenient to the others. After Russia had obtained the passage of the Dardanelles for several of her torpedo boats, Roumania, acting on the advice of her allies, applied for permission for the
