EWERS Clark, Clark's Mills, has just had completed the installing of a new milling plant which is second to none in the province. The plant is a Fall Roller Process, manufactured by Wm. & J. G. Grey, Toronto, and has a capacity of turning out sixty barrels of flour every 24 hours. The outfit comprises, one Milling Separator, one Cripple Separator, one Wheat Sifter, one Wheat Conditioning Plant, four Double Sets of Roller Mills, one Purifier, one Perfection Dust Collector, one Plan-sifter, two Little Wonder Dressers, one Hand Packer, two Feed Fillers, one Hopper Scale, one 2,000 lb Scale, one Packer Scale. The plant was installed by W. W. Sanderson of Barrie, Ont., and is the second he has placed in this province. The mill gets its power from the waters of Wilnot River and is manipulated with ease and despatch. With the new and improved appliances, Mr. Clark is prepared to turn out flour from our home grown wheat far better than the imported article, and farmers will find it to their advantage to take their grain to "the old and the new" Clark's Mills. Frank Warren of Bedouque has been engaged to run the mill.
