..RALLY DAY.—The Montague Christian Church held its Sunday School Rally Day Exercises, Sunday evening, September 30th, which was largely attended. ### THE ANGELS OF MONS WERE REAL, AND THE GERMANS WERE STOPPED SAYS ANGLICAN RECTOR

ST. JOHN, October 4.—That the angels assisted the British during the memorable retreat from Mons was the belief expressed last night by Captain the Rev. Gustav A. Kuhring, rector of St. John's Anglican church, who in a sermon on "The angels at Mons," in observance of the feast of St. Michael and all angels told of strange manifestations. Captain Kuhring was in France with a New Brunswick unit during his sermon he said: "At Mons, whole divisions of German cavalry, flushed with success, surged forward like a tidal wave against the few battalions of our troops that could be placed against them. Suddenly they stopped, the horses would go no farther. The British, weak as they were, could do nothing to stop them, and, as was later found out from German prisoners, there had been no orders from behind to stop. We had the testimony of the German captain and some of his men as well as that of our own soldiers, that as the Germans moved forward, what appeared to be a yellow light came between the armies and the British claim to have seen St. George on a white horse leading crowds of cavalry against the enemy."

"Lieutenant Colonel Rice tells of riding with a small party of horsemen towards the enemy. They were going along a road at dusk when he thought he saw a battalion after battalion of horsemen riding along in the fields on both sides of them. He watched them for about ten minutes and then one of the officers asked him what he had seen. He told him and a third officer answered that he had seen the same thing and many of the men in the column saw the horseman also. When they arrived at their destination, a party was sent out to investigate but saw nothing. The horsemen had vanished."

Rev. Mr. Kuhring told of a charge of a small body of British on an enemy trench at Mons. As the British advanced, numbers of horsemen went with them and, as the men say, carrying bows and arrows. This is borne out by the question of a German officer later taken prisoner. He asked: "Who were those men with bows and arrows? We tried to get their leader, the one on the white horse, but could not hit him."

"It is sworn to also by numerous witnesses," said Mr. Kuhring, "that when the British came to examine the bodies of the German dead, by far the larger number of them had no wounds on their bodies."

### Italy Preparing New Great Drive

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—Semi-official advices from Rome reaching Washington today, indicate that the Italian offensive on the Austrian front is now entering the second and most important stage of the battle on the Bainsizza Plateau and both sides are making extraordinary preparations for the counter-attack. General Cadorna, who has been in Rome for a conference with the Council of Ministers, has been consolidating his positions on the Bainsizza Plateau with the view of flanking Monte San Daniels and undertaking a new offensive toward Lubiano (Lalbach).

Meanwhile the French and British have sent additional warships to the northern waters of the Adriatic, and Italian troops may soon strike at Trieste in a combined land and sea offensive, aided by Entente naval forces.

### DENTISTS FOR THE CANADIAN SOLDIERS

TORONTO, October 4.—Satisfaction with the condition of the teeth of returned Canadian soldiers and with the treatment they received while overseas, is not universal. There is a difference between English and Canadian dentistry, and it was the subject of vigorous discussion among returned soldiers this morning. The dental services in the army will have to be materially increased if proper dental service is to be given to the hundred thousand men composing the first class to be called to the colors under the Military Service Act, declared one speaker. "The lamentable condition of the teeth of some of the returned Canadians would also indicate that there will have to be some further effort made to give the boys at the front better dental attention."

"Unfortunately, thru some misunderstanding, many of the Canadian dentists, have not been permitted to follow the troops over to France. This is an astounding state of affairs when one considers the prevalence of both trench mouth and dental disease. The Canadian dentists could prevent much of this trouble and relieve a great deal of the suffering of the men. It is a well-known fact that the physical welfare of the troops depends in no small degree upon the condition of their teeth. Why should hundreds of Canadian soldiers be incapacitated in this way and returned to the base for treatment, when the presence of a Canadian dentist attached to each Canadian battalion would entirely overcome the difficulty?"

This is the question that many of the returned men are asking.

### BRITISH REPRISALS FOR LONDON RAIDS ARE NOW LIKELY

Government is Said to Await Only the Word from the Military Command

LONDON, Oct. 5.—Demands for retaliation in kind upon German cities grow with each recurrence of air raids on London. The Evening Standard yesterday asserted "on the highest authority" that the Government was paying special attention to the question of reprisals, saying: "There is no qualification about the decision of the Government to undertake very effective reprisals at the earliest moment consistent with the advice of the high military command."

Semi-official explanations that the British cannot spare machine for reprisals are questioned by the Northcliffe newspapers, the Daily Express and others, which point out that the Germans are able to spare aircraft for raiding England and have enough along the battle lines to give the British a continuing fight for supremacy in the air on the fighting front.

It is argued that the Germans have evidently outbuilt the British in aircraft and may be expected to continue building on an increasing scale and to improve the types of their machines, while the British are trying to catch up with them. Predictions that this would be the case were made by some of the newspapers and by experts like Lord Montagu of Beaulieu months ago. Lord Montagu also predicts that the Germans will soon pass the experimental stage of operations and be able to attack London in all kinds of weather, nearly every night.

The Wilhelmshaven Tageblatt publishes advice warning the people that German naval base against possible air raids by the Entente aviators.

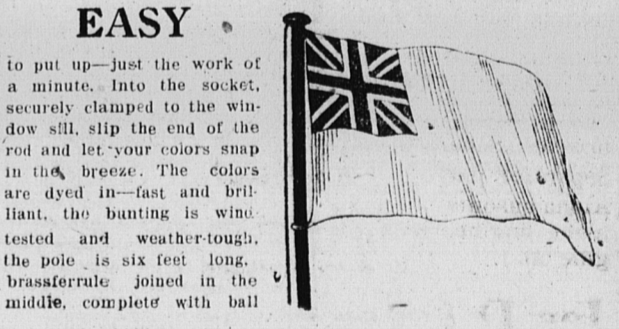
