Contract Bridge

Not a case for a "Rule"
The "rule" is that when a declarer has nine cards of a suit, heart and club, the queen, he should cash the ace and king in hope of a drop. There is nothing so iron-clad about this principle, however, that it should not be altered to fit the conditions. Let's look at a case in which observance of the "rule" was extremely bad bridge:
North dealer
Both sides vulnerable.

The bidding:
North East South West
1 Pass 2 Pass
2 Pass 2NT Pass

South bid aggressively when he persisted to three notrump, but this action would have been handsomely rewarded if his play had been better.
West opened his fourth-highest heart and club situated against queen. Now, obviously proceeding on the theory that the missing queen of clubs "should" fall in two leads, South led low to the ace and returned a club to his own king.
The quite normal 3-1 break of clubs was a terrible blow to South. For now, when he knocked out the club queen, East, getting his inspiration from some unknown source, shifted to the diamond queen instead of returning a partner's suit, and a heart bit of nerve rolled up the score against the opponents. South's diamond king was smothered and East was put back on lead to run the diamonds, then a heart return through South's J-9 gave West the entire suit. The contract was down a cool five tricks!
