Huns Expect to Adjust Their Finances With "Indemnity"

Amsterdam, via London, Feb. 3.—The Hungarian Finance Minister, M. Teleny, replying today to an inquiry of a member of the lower house as to the reasons for the adverse rate of exchange, said the decline was in consequence of the isolation of the Central Powers, but, he added, it would disappear immediately after the war, especially in view of the large indemnity which would be expected owing to the military strength of the Central Powers.

The minister declared that the government was preparing to limit rigorously the importation of all articles of luxury, and taking other measures to ameliorate the exchange.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. An applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (that not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. 1/2-acre exemption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years. Cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$3.00. In case of rough scrubby or stony land, the stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W.
