Although of a somewhat quiet and retiring disposition, by his courteous manner and honest business methods he made numerous friends who always found it a pleasure and convenience to deal with him. On his retiring from active business, the late Mr. McDonald spent his leisure quietly at home. For some years he was a member of the City School Board and was also connected with the Department of Fisheries. He leaves to mourn besides a sorrowing widow the following sons and daughters: Joseph B. of the C. N. R., Moncton, Ernest S., Vice President of the Bank of Manhattan, New York; Frederick C., Assistant Chief Inspector, Bank of Commerce, Toronto; Louis, Chief Clerk, Freight and Passenger Office, C. N. R., City; Mrs. A. B. O'Brien, Medford, Mass.; Mary, R. N. Public Health Nurse, Boston City Hospital; Mrs. J. B. Thompson, Kitchener, Ont.; Annie, of the teaching staff of Queen Square School City, and Rita of the Soldiers' Settlement Board, City. To the bereaved the Guardian extends heartfelt sympathy.
