Latest News of the City and Province.

The steamer Bete arrived Thursday from Bermuda, having had a fine passage. Two days ago she met the flagship Crescent, bound to Bermuda. She brought up ten man-of-war sailors who are going to England, and the crew of W. and C. H. Mitchell's topsail schooner San Blas, wrecked at Jamaica several weeks ago.—Morning Chronicle.

ANOTHER freak of Canada's growing time—Mr. Alex Cairns of Lower Freetown who is one of our most successful horticulturists, brought to town yesterday a bunch of four cabbages grown from one stem—all life size, and in the best of health. The freak was put in cold storage with the intention of showing it to some friends, but a meddling cow scried vigorously at the exhibition and destroyed all evidences except a number of reliable living witnesses who will at any time give testimony in the matter.

DUNDAS NOTES.—No shipping is being done here at present, and only three schooners have loaded up to the present date, viz: Schr. Nutwood, loaded by W. E. Leard for Matthew Maclean and Co., Schr. Flora Temple by the same firm and Schr. C. A. Gorham by W. A. Burdett & Co. This is a small showing when compared with former years when we have seen eight or ten vessels all loading on the same day. The change does not indicate retrogression but revolution in farming methods. Hence it has been potatoes and oats, now it is cheese, butter, hogs, lambs, etc.

Island Cheese Making.

A gentleman who is interested in cheese writes to the GUARDIAN, referring to the production of November cheese and quotes from the advice given by the Montreal Cheese and Butter Association, and is strongly of the opinion that what applies to the cheese industry of Ontario and Quebec is particularly applicable to the cheese men of Prince Edward Island, and should be strictly adhered to, if the reputation of the Island's product is to be maintained. The following is an extract from an article published in the Farmer of a recent date:

"The Montreal Cheese and Butter Association has again advised dairymen not to make November cheese. The reason given is that late cheese reacts in an unfavorable manner upon the Canadian cheese market just as fodder cheese does. The association urges the factorymen where practicable to make creamery butter during November, and the balance of the season packing it in boxes, which is the favorite package for export, or in tubs if intended for local use."

In speaking of this season's work the writer is afraid that owing to the high prices paid that many of our Island factories will continue during the present month. If such is the case the suggestion given by the farmer, in the following paragraph is a good one:

Every effort should be made to have the quality of the product as fine as possible. Patrons should give special attention to the milk and see that no food producing bad flavors in the cheese is given to the cows while the factories are in operation. When cold weather comes patrons neglect to aerate the milk thoroughly. This is just as necessary now as in any other season of the year. If the cows have been eating anything that will cause bad flavors in the milk a thorough aeration as soon as the milk is taken from the cow will help matters considerably. Then makers and factory owners should see to it that the curing and making-rooms are in proper shape for making and curing the cheese properly. Provided the milk is delivered in good condition it is possible to make really fine cheese this month if the factory buildings are such that the temperature can be kept under control. But, comparatively few factories have the best equipment for making cheese in cold weather, and hence the greater likelihood of there being a lot of inferior cheese made. Our advice to dairymen who are determined to make cheese under these unfavorable conditions is: Look after the curing room and don't feed turnips.
