SPORTING COMMENT BY "TEC" Will Arrive Monday

Jack McKenna, recognized Canadian welterweight and middleweight champion, will leave Detroit Saturday morning or thereabouts and is scheduled to arrive in this city Monday evening to begin light workouts preparatory to his bout this night week, Friday, May 11th, with battling Jimmy Cox of New York, who is also due in this city on Monday or Tuesday. This bout is the talk of the city, and as many commercial men express it, will be the talk of the Maritime Provinces.

McKenna's reputation as a fighter and a tiger under fire is already well known in this city and elsewhere, and this added to Cox's prestige as a boxer and his reputation as a K. O. artist, it looks as if Prince Edward Island boxing fans are in for a bout that will go down in history as the premier glorie event in Eastern Canada.

Cox has fought all over Europe and the United States, performing creditably all the time, and to date during his last 50 fights, has won 24 by way of "dreamland alley."

McKenna, no doubt has improved greatly as a boxer and a craftsman while in the States, under the guidance of Eddie Meade, therefore it looks an even bet to pick a winner.

Cox is a long distance fighter, as his record shows, going at times 25 rounds to a decision, therefore with the shape McKenna is in at the present time and Cox's ability to assimilate punishment, those who are lucky enough to see the fixture will undoubtedly witness a whirlwind engagement.

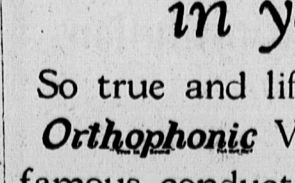

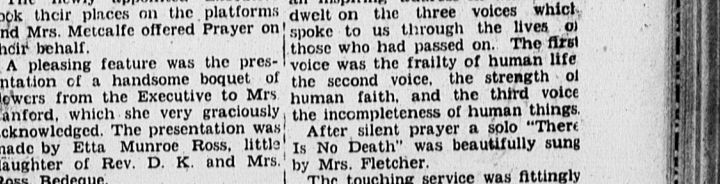
