BUSINESS PLACES COMPLAIN.

St. Louis, June 10—Theaters, stores, saloons and other places of business and entertainment are bitterly disappointed at the shrinkage in receipts since the fair opened, when they looked for an enormous increase in business.

Several of the leading theatres have closed their doors for the season, and St. Louis citizens complain that most of the money brought in by visitors is gathered in by the strangers within the fair grounds, and the hotels and boarding-houses.

BATON FOR KING EDWARD.

LONDON, June 11.—Archduke Frederick of Austria has arrived in London bringing with him the field marshal's baton bestowed by Emperor Francis Joseph on King Edward.

NOTED ATHLETE WAS SHOT DEAD

In New York While Driving With Actress

Miss Patterson Arrested, on Charge of Being Guilty—Detectives Working up the Case.

While driving in a hansom cab in New York on Monday afternoon in company with Anna Patterson, a chorus girl in the "Florodora" company, "Caesar" Young, the noted race horse man and athlete, was shot dead.

On a charge of having done the deed Miss Patterson was arrested. A New York despatch says:

"The police are now convinced that 'Caesar' Young was not shot and killed by his own revolver while riding with Nan Patterson, the 'Florodora' sextette girl, in a hansom cab."

"Detective Armstrong has traced the weapon and knows who owned it. It was sold in November, 1923, across the counter of Schoverling, Daly and Fales at No. 302 Broadway. At that time Young was in San Francisco."

"J. Morgan Smith, husband of Nan Patterson's sister, was in New York in November in 1923. Detective Armstrong questioned Mr. Smith about the revolver, but he declined to answer. He has been subpoenaed to appear before the grand jury, when he will be questioned further. It is expected that the ownership of the revolver will be established before the grand jury."

"Nan Patterson was taken back to the Tombs after having been before Justice Clark twice. Her father called and spent an hour with her."

"Nan, I'll stand by you," he said.

"The parting between them was affecting."

"A strong light was thrown upon certain phases of this case when it was learned that Nan Patterson once had attempted to commit suicide, or at least to convey the impression that she had attempted suicide, and by the statement of Mrs. Young that Nan had a revolver in her room in the Imperial hotel with which she had threatened Caesar Young."

"R. S. McKean, the brother of Mrs. Young, does not believe the bookmaker was murdered. 'I have come to the conclusion,' he said, 'that the probabilities are all against the theory that Nan Patterson deliberately killed him. I think the revolver was discharged in a struggle following some demonstration by the woman.'"

A later despatch says:

"From two sources light was to-night let into the mystery that has surrounded the shooting of Caesar Young, who was killed last Saturday morning while riding in a cab with Nan Patterson, an actress. Three witnesses were brought into the case to-day and one of them was taken to the Tombs and permitted to see the Patterson woman. This was done for the purpose of identifying her, if possible, as the person who purchased a revolver which is believed to be the one with which Caesar Young was killed. About this witness all manner of mystery is thrown."

Further light was cast upon the subject by the shouting of a woman, whose identity has not been disclosed, but who is believed to be the aunt of Algebron C. Meyer, of Jacksonville, Fla., who told District Attorney Jerome a story to the effect that he was an eye-witness of Caesar Young's suicide. Detective Sergeant Edward Armstrong to-night attempted to take this woman to see Mr. Garvan, but she refused to go. Later Assistant District Attorney Rind went to her home, No. 54 West Twenty-second street, where she told a story which is admitted to be of considerable importance."

"Algebron C. Meyer, whose home is in Jacksonville, Fla., but who is living temporarily in this city, told the district attorney to-day that he saw the shot fired which killed Young. He says there was a struggle in the cab, and it is his belief that Young held the revolver, and that his companion was attempting to wrest it from him. To-night Captain Sweeney of the Leonard street station and Assistant District Attorney Rind took him over the scene of the tragedy, and became convinced that his story will not stand a severe investigation."

"Mr. Unger, counsel for Nan Patterson, said that he had no reason for believing that a struggle of any sort took place in the cab between Young and the woman."

PRETTY WEDDING AT ALL SOUL'S CHURCH.

The marriage of Miss Gertrude Elizabeth Metcalf, daughter of Merrill and Mrs. Metcalf to William Duncan Mackenzie took place last night at All Soul's Church, Rev. Dr. Pierce officiating assisted by Dr. Kant, pastor of the People's Church.

The ushers, George Warren, A. Merrill Titus, cousin of the bride, A. Upperman and W. W. Fugate, after seating the guests preceded the couple to the platform.

The bride wore a beautiful gown of white crepe de chene over white silk and carried a shower bouquet of bride roses. She wore to veil, but white roses were in her hair.

During the ceremony of Scotch airs were softly played in compliment to the groom who is of Scotch descent. Later the couple left for a tour northward. They will spend a short time in Baltimore and go from there to Niagara Falls and Watkins Glen. When they return they will be at home to their friends at the Landmore 1133, 24th St. N. W.

The bride is connected with many of the prominent Clubs of the District and is a graduate of Columbia University. Many handsome presents of cut glass, silver, hand painted china and furniture were received.—Washington Star.

THREW HERSELF OVERBOARD.

TORONTO, June 12.—O. Saturday Gertrude Seol, 18, aged nineteen, threw herself from the St. Lawrence r.t.r. 1 g from Cayton N. Y. to Kingston, where the girl resided with her aunt, Mrs. Kimble, and was drowned. The latter had rebuked the girl for drinking wine and beer. The body was not recovered.

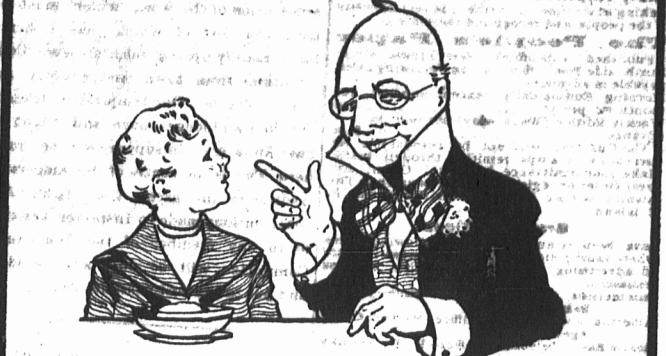

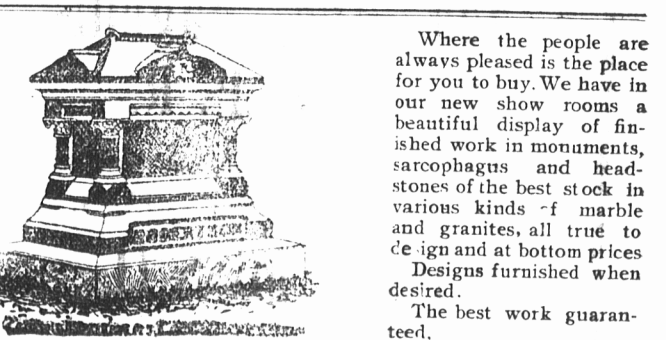
