## Bruins Defeat Amerks 3-2 In Hectic Contest

### Leafs Score 6-0 Decision Over Wings

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—New York Americans' bid for clear ownership of second place in the National Hockey League was checked tonight when they were nosed out 3-2 by the leading Boston Bruins.

It was a rough, tumultuous game before 14,843 spectators in Madison Square Garden. The win increased the Bruins' lead in the National Hockey League to eight points over the Americans and the idle New York Rangers.

A disputed goal by Eddie Shore and a fist fight between Bill Hollett and Neil Stewart added to 60 minutes of fast rugged hockey. In the closing minutes the Americans took out goalie Earl Robertson and put six forwards on the ice.

Besides Shore, Cooney Weiland and Roy Conacher tallied for the Bruins while the American marksmen were Eddie Wiseman and Holey Smith. Tommy Anderson, the Americans' star winger, was held to one assist to boost his point average.

Stewart and Hollett were given five minute major penalties and match penalties for the remainder of the game for their fistfights.

TORONTO, Jan. 29.—Detroit Red Wings have one more chance to score a goal on Toronto Ice during the National Hockey League schedule.

For the third straight time, Toronto Maple Leafs snarled out the Wings Saturday night with a 6-0 decision that repelled the Detroit challenge to the Leafs' hold on fourth position in the standing. In previous meetings here, Jack Adams' band had been blanked 5-0 and 2-0.

Aided by a cleftstick Wing defence, the Toronto forwards staged another of their field goals and divided the goals among six players. One score went to little Gus Marker, right wingman who returned to the lineup after an absence of nearly two months through a leg injury. The others were snared by Gordon Drillon, Sylvanus Apps, Murph Chamberlain, Pep Kelly and Harvey Jackson.

Coach Dick Irvin was absent from the Toronto bench through a touch of influenza and Manager Conny Smythe directed operations. But in Irvin's absence the Leaf attack clicked quickly for three first-period goals and the defensive machinery functioned smoothly all night to help goalie Turk Broda to his seventh shut-out of the season.

## Buswell Gives Canadiens 1-0 Victory Over Hawks; Leafs - Wings Play Tie

CHICAGO, Jan. 29.—In their first start since Manager Cecil Hart was removed, Montreal Canadiens scored a 1-0 shutout over the champion Chicago Black Hawks tonight, the win leaving them with four points to go to climb out of the National Hockey League cellar.

After close to an hour of scoreless hockey, defenceman Walter Buswell broke up the game in the 18th minute, drilling home the winner with the help of Toe Blake and Johnny Gagnon. A double relay on a Canadian zangnik attack left Buswell in position for a short shot that beat goalie Mike Karakas.

The game, before 12,500 spectators, marked the managerial debut of Jules Dugal, secretary of the Canadian club, and his assistant defenceman Babe Siebert. They took over Friday after Hart, manager of the Hawks, was removed.

Chicago, also managed by a pair of pilots—Paul Thompson and Carl Voss—since the dismissal of Bill Stewart a few weeks ago, ran up a record of only six goals in their last nine starts.

## The SNAPSHOT GUILD

Shadows tell a story here—more cleverly than a direct shot of the ski group would have told it. Watch for shadows—they yield many a novel snapshot.

ARE you looking for snapshot ideas? Then just load up your camera, and have a try at shadow pictures.

On a sunny day outdoors, every solid object casts a shadow. If this shadow falls on a light-toned surface, such as smooth snow or concrete, it stands out clearly—and there may be a picture opportunity there.

People doing things cast shadows that often tell a complete story. A group of winter hikers or a ski party climbing a slope may produce shadows which make a more interesting "story" snapshot than the group itself.

Many objects cast interesting patterns of shadow. A tree near a street lamp may throw a delicate tracery of shadow on a nearby building wall. A short time exposure of this, made with the camera on a firm support—and you have an unusual picture.

Old-fashioned, ornate iron fences and gateways not only produce fascinating shadow patterns, but are often interesting pictures themselves. Include both the shadow and the ironwork in one picture, shooting from a viewpoint that shows as many "repeats" of the pattern as possible.

Indoors, there are many chances for shadow pictures. Use a single photo bulb at one end of a room, and direct its light on the far wall. Let members of your family stand so that they cast grotesque shadows on this wall. Changing their distance from the light, and the height of the photo bulb from the floor, produces unusual effects.

With this shadow arrangement, it is easy to have your subjects act out story-telling ideas. Short "time" exposures will be required in taking these pictures, because of the distance between the light and the illuminated wall. With a box camera, try exposures of several seconds.

Whenever you're taking pictures, watch for shadow effects. They're the making of many a snapshot, and a special "shadow hunt," with your camera loaded and ready, might be worth your while.
