Earliest Advertisements

(By British United Press) LONDON, July 26 - Quaintly worded and entertaining newspaper advertisements referring to the Plague and the Great Fire of London are forwarded to The London Daily Chronicle by readers who claim them to be the earliest advertisements of their type. A few weeks ago the honour of being the first newspaper advertisement was claimed for one discovered in the files of a Fleet street office. It was dated 1665. Below are advertisements dated 1658, 1665 and 1666.

The following is taken from the "London Gazette" of 1658: "The excellent, and by all physicians approved, China Drink called by the Chinesea Toha, by other nations Tay, alias Tee, is sold at the Sultane's Head, a Cophie House in Swettings Rents by the Royal Exchange, London."

In the "News" of 1665 appeared the following: "There is a Powder to be burnt into a Fume prepared by Mr. Eustace Burnaby who received it from the author of it, Doctor Tobias Whittaker, Physician-in-Ordinary to His Majesty, of the Sovereign effects against the Plague and also contagious diseases, that being conveyed to divers houses as were visited as free, in the Parish of Giles in the fields, there hast not any person died out of the houses where it has been used, as is attested under the hands of Dr. Bowman, Rector and John Grey, sexton of the said Parish."

Upsets Feature Play At Maritime Golf Championships

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Long Projected Pictorial Record Now Completed

(Canadian Press) LONDON, July 25 - General approval has greeted the bestowal of a knighthood upon the eminent painter George Clausen, dean of the group of painters who have affected the mural paintings illustrating the history which were unveiled in St. Stephen's Hall adjoining the Houses of Parliament by Premier Stanley Baldwin. Sir George Clausen's own contribution was a depiction of the reading of Weylfe's Bible to a gathering secretly brought together to hear it, and constitutes a landscape study, full of the quiet beauty of the English countryside. It is one of the most effective of the group of eight paintings. As for the group as a whole there are commendations for the ingenuity exhibited in keeping a sense of harmony in the series. The paintings measure 15 by 10 feet and are appropriate to the surrounding colour scheme of the walls and of the stained glass windows above. The historical period covered is from the days of Alfred the Great to the Union with Scotland. The other seven paintings are "Queen Elizabeth, Commissioning Sir Walter Raleigh to sail for America," by A. K. Lawrence; "King John confronted by the Barons," by Charles S. S. S.; "King Alfred's Longships," by Colin Gill; "Richard the First Leaving for the Crusades," by Glyn Philip; "Sir Thomas Roe at the court of the Moral Emperor," by Professor Rothenstein; and "The English and Scotch Commissioners" by W. T. Monnington. Each panel was given by a separate donor - the Duke of Devonshire, Lord Davenport, Lord Burnham, the Duke of Portland, Lord Fitzalan of Derwent, Lord Derby, the Duke of Bedford, and Lord Younger of Leckie.

Mr. R. H. Jenkins Speaks At Rotary

Following is the address "Snapshots from Ottawa and Parliament" given by Mr. R. H. Jenkins at Rotary on Monday: Mr. Jenkins spoke in part as follows: The capital city of any country is always an interesting place to those who are concerned in the affairs of government. Ottawa is no exception to the rule. It is a beautiful city of approximately 120,000 people, and when the session is on it includes many hundreds more; for not only do the members come to attend the sessional services, but also those who want things from Parliament, and are prepared to back up their claims in the strongest possible way. At other times the city is more or less quiet, and things move along with very little commotion. A great many of those who live in Ottawa are employed in the Civil Service, and quite a number from our own province are working there. Personally, we have always found the officials of the various Departments courteous, obliging and painstaking in their work, and it is gratifying to note that those who have gone from our own province are well regarded and have made good. To those in the Service, the session means more work, because a member of Parliament is always able to ask the Union for a position or place in the order paper, which in itself may sound simple but which may entail a vast amount of work in the different Departments. The Service, therefore, gives a big sigh of relief when the Session is over and the House adjourns.

The session means a great deal to Ottawa. It helps business in practically every line. The hotels receive a larger patronage, and those who desire excitement the never ceasing round of social functions makes life very pleasant. In many and various ways the community life is made more active, and so whether you worship at the shrine of Sir John A. MacDonald or that of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, you will find Ottawa, especially when the session is on, well worth visiting. Quebec had been the capital of the province of Canada from before the days of the conquest until the "Constitutional Act" was passed in England in 1791. This legislation divided the old Colony into the two provinces of Upper and Lower Canada; the capital of the latter remained at Quebec, and Toronto became the capital of the former. In accordance with this provision, the seat of government was fixed at Kingston, Ontario, by Lord Sydenham. In the second session the members of the Legislative Assembly, by a vote of two to one, decided that it was not a desirable place for the capital. In that year Charles Dickens paid the place a visit, and gave a dismal picture of it. "Kingston that one-half of it seems to be burned down and the other half not built up." Little did he foresee the handsome and populous city of many years later. However, in 1842, the capital of November, 1843, Montreal was chosen as the seat of government by a vote of 61 to 27.
