Silence Hides Fate Of Indian Maiden

MIAMI Fla., May 29.—(AP)—The lonely, rain-rattling silence of the Everglades hid the fate today of a 17-year-old Indian maid accused of falling in love with a white youth and violating the Seminoles' strict tribal laws in having a child by him.

Brought before a stern-faced council of her elders at the Seminoles' rustic annual tree court dance, the girl stoically heard the charge and then turned away, her cheeks white with heartbreak but with no sign of fear for her self.

The verdict of the tribal council was not disclosed and probably never will be.

O. B. White, Miami lawyer for the Seminoles and honorary chief-in-law, said that after the Indians' 11-day encampment at a secret rendezvous deep in the swamps breaks up Saturday, the girl would probably "disappear" in the vast wilderness of saw-grass and cypress swamps.

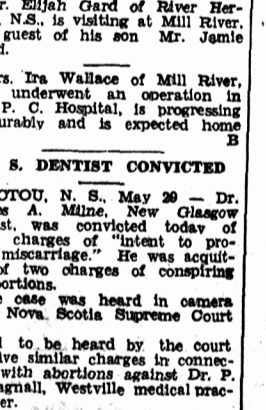
"What happens to her will never be known," he said.

SUCCESSFUL RIVER DRIVE — CAMPBELLTON, N. B., May 29.—(CP)—One of the most successful runs on record, the lumber drive down the Restigouche River from Kedgwick has ended in the boom at Atholville and Bordet.

Good progress was reported today and the entire spring drive is expected to be ended before Sunday.

The cut amounted to about 100,000,000 feet—an average total.

Maps above show, top, possible supplies of cereal foods available for distribution to the fam-hungry areas shown below, as described by Herbert Hoover in his recent report to President Truman after a 35,000-mile tour which took him to 22 food-deficient countries and to five which have surpluses. Figures on lower map show his estimate of the food import needs of these nations as from May 1 to September 1. Hoover points out that cereals, particularly wheat and rice, are the primary need, as they can furnish 85 per cent of emergency diet. Note that there is a deficit of 3,587,000 tons between food available and total amount needed.

Life Insurance Officers Meet

LONDON, Ont., May 29.—(CP)—Edwin C. McDonald of Ottawa was elected president of the Canadian Life Insurance Officers Association at the annual meeting today. He succeeds John D. Buchanan of this city.

Mr. McDonald, vice-president of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, in charge of the Canadian head office, is the first officer of a United States company to be named president in the Association's history. He is a native of Columbus O.

Other officers elected were: First vice-president W. M. Anderson, Toronto, general manager of the North American Life Insurance Company; second vice-president S. C. McEwen, Toronto, president of the Canadian Life Assurance Company; and honorary treasurer H. L. Guy, Waterloo, Ont., assistant general manager and treasurer of the Mutual Life Assurance Company of Canada.

Family Allowances Administration Costs

(By The Canadian Press) — OTTAWA, May 29.—It cost \$788,141 to administer the Family Allowances Act from July to Dec. 31, 1945. Alan Cockeran (PC-York South) was informed today in a return tabled in the Commons.

There were 488 temporary and 36 permanent employees of the administration two weeks ago the Health Department stated. Of those, 384 received less than \$1,500 in basic salary, 115 got between \$1,500 and \$2,500, 17 between \$2,500 and \$3,600, seven more than \$3,600 and one more than \$5,000.

The head, R. B. Curry received \$1,200. In those same six months, allowances paid out totalled \$113,701,557. At the end of April 1,413,603 families were receiving the allowances.
