

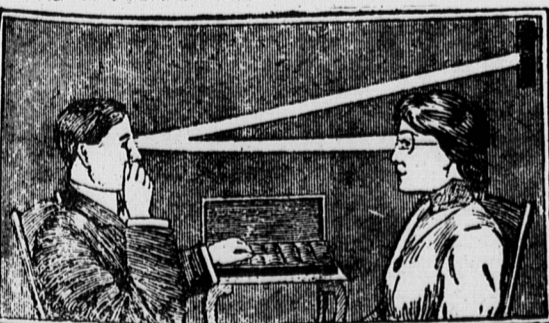

SPLENDOR MARKS BIG WEDDING OF YOUNG VANDERBILT

NEW YORK, April 30.—(By Allen E. Summer, United News).—A reporter in \$40 a week was married yesterday in the first million dollar wedding New York has witnessed since the war, and with thousands of invited guests vainly clamoring to join the throng that filled the church and bulged out through the doors.
Society en masse, a large detail of uniformed, an equally strong force of obvious plain clothes men and thousands upon thousands of out-and-out ordinary New Yorkers, swirled in a vast crowd at St. Thomas' on the avenue, while young Cornelius Vanderbilt was wedding pretty Rachel Littleton. It was just the greatest society event that New York had ever seen, not even excluding those gorgeous pre-war weddings of little Vivian Gould to Lord Decies, and of Consuelo Vanderbilt to the Duke of Marlborough. His splendor silence even those society harpies who see no charm in a wedding without a foreign title.

GIFTS WERE GORGEOUS
Although young "Neely" Vanderbilt is only a reporter there were gifts valued at over a million dollars, and unique in rarity and sentiment, a cake that cost \$2,500 weighed hundreds of pounds, and made a thousand slices, a bridegown containing a king's ransom in pearls, and an audience including many gonghboys and others not included in the social register. Fifth avenue traffic for seven blocks was tied up.
Directly guarded the display of gifts during the ceremony and reception. These numbered a \$300, 000 diamond tiara from Brigadier-General and Mrs. Cornelius Vanderbilt, parents of the groom; a platinum and diamond pin, the groom's gift to the bride; a diamond wrist watch on a pearl bracelet, the gift of William K. Vanderbilt, junior; a large variety of George I silver, a Belgian lace tablecloth from Ambassador and Mrs. Hugh C. Wallace; and an original copy of the late Cornelius Vanderbilt's book "Around the World," presented by Mr. and Mrs. Henry Bull.

THOUSANDS AT CHURCH
The police were not prepared for the curious mob that bore down upon St. Thomas' as early as one o'clock, though the wedding hour was four. In spite of the valiant work of the police, about 300 uninvited guests stormed the gates and were ejected only with great difficulty. As it was, the church was filled and running over before half the guests were inside. The situation developed from the issuance of five thousand invitations to a seating capacity of only 500, and an acceptance of over three-fourths of the invitations. Some of the Four Hundred's most elite were left to mingle outside with the crushing mob. Police utterly disregarded their flapping invitations, and even rode upon them when they tried to go under the canopy.

It was half-past four before the bridal party appeared, the bride Miss Rachel Littleton, arriving with her brother, Martin Littleton, a prominent lawyer. As the full vestal choir of boys began singing of "Love Divine," the procession began from the back of the church to the altar, which was heavily decorated with cherry blossoms, lilies, palms and roses. The pews were barred from the central aisle by lustrous white satin ribbons strewn with white lilies. Eight ushers, close friends of the groom, in dress suits, preceded, followed by the minister, Rev. Ernest M. Stires.

The six bridesmaids wore shepherdess costumes of rose bodices and silver hooped skirts. Wax tapers of white lighorn wreathed in garden sprays, and tied with Alice blue satin ribbons were worn, each carried a shepherd's basket of tiny pink rabbits. The maid of honor, Miss Minnie Littleton, sister of the bride, was dressed as the bridesmaid, with the exception of a blue bodice rather than rose, and a basket of house roses.

The bride wore heavy satin liberally sprinkled with seed pearls, and crystal beading. The skirt of the gown was draped and panned, but the blouse carried out the classic effect and was entirely of pearls and beading over the satin under train of quivering satin and pearls has the distinction of being one of the longest ever worn by a bride. She wore a long veil of tulle and orange blossoms and carried a shower bouquet of lilies of the valley and white orchids. She walked up the aisle on the arm of her brother, Martin Littleton.

The bridal chorus from Lohen-grin was played as the procession cleared the altar. This blended into "Oh, Perfect Love," while the service was being read. The responses of the groom were audible even in the rear of the great church, though the bride's were very faint. Only the one ring was used, and the words "To obey" were not eliminated from the service as has been the custom. The recessional was Mendelssohn's wedding march.

The police were also called upon to handle the uninvited mob that congregated at the Littleton residence, where the reception was held. Nearly a thousand people came here to shake hands with the newlyweds and partake of the huge wedding cake that filled an entire bay window. The cake, built of seven diminishing pyramids, the lower one four feet in diameter, gleaming a miniature white castle against a fern background. Twenty pounds of the cake was kept to be sealed in tin boxes until the silver anniversary of today's bride and groom.

Miss Littleton is a southern girl who had been living here with her brother. The romance began at their summer home in Long Island where young Vanderbilt often cruised in his private yacht. After a honeymoon in the south, Mr. and Mrs. Vanderbilt will return to New York, where Vanderbilt will resume his \$40 a week job on the Times.

Another gift that seemed to seepily touch the groom was a coarse leather pocketbook from a coachman who had been in the family prior to "Neely's" birth.

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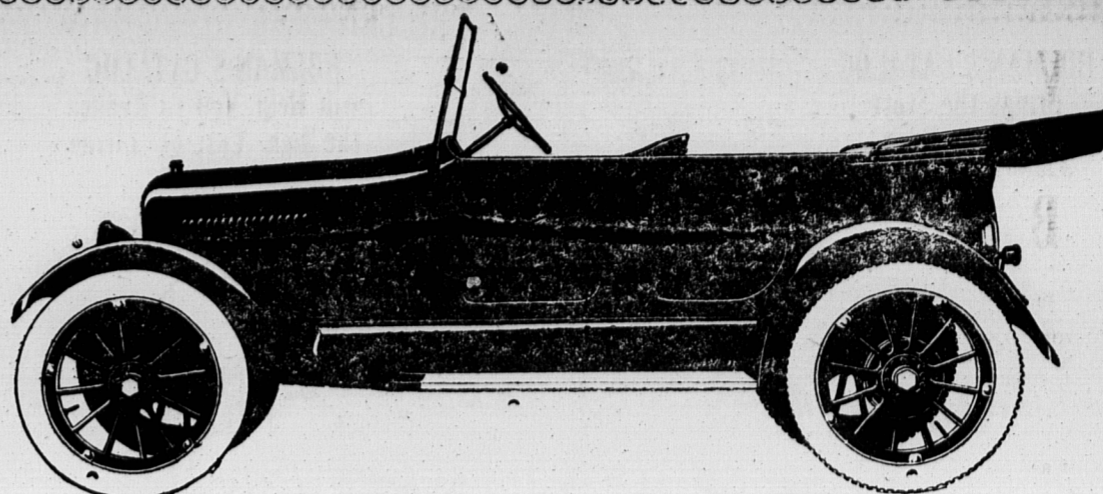
