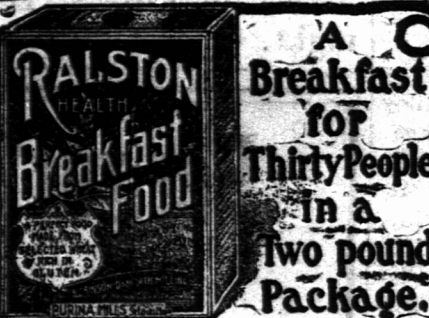

## THE CHINESE IN AMERICA.

There are about 150,000 Chinese in the United States. The number in Canada is uncertain, although a registration of those coming and going has been kept. From 1886 to 1893 inclusive 20,308 were registered as entering the country, and 9,504 registered as departing. But it is quite certain, owing to the head tax that many were smuggled into the Dominion, and equally certain that many have made their exit secretly, either to enter the United States or to return to China. The Chinese in Canada are principally adult men, and probably three fourths of the total number, be it 15,000 or 20,000 are located in British Columbia. There is a small sprinkling of Celestials in every large Canadian city. In like manner in the United States three fourths of the Chinese population is resident on the Pacific Coast, with varying numbers in the cities of the Central and Eastern States, rising to thousands in Chicago and New York.

The present trouble in China, with the attendant massacres of white people and Christians there which have so profoundly moved the civilized world, has invested with a new and strange interest the Chinese population of the new world. Their presence in America has always been unwelcome. They are alien to us in race, religion and habits. They enter as competitors in the labor markets and so arouse the hostility of the white laborers, operatives and artisans with whom they compete. Their competition tends powerfully to lower the rate of wages, for a Chinese can live on a mere fraction of what it costs to maintain an American laborer, and can grow rich according to Chinese ideas on a pittance which would starve the American. Hence the natural antagonism existing between the white and yellow races is increased by the conditions existing in the labor market, and from time to time in years past there have been riots and outbreaks of lawless hostility in those parts of America where the Chinese population is of any considerable proportions.

To the previous causes of mutual antagonism a new and exciting element has now been added by the warfare and massacres now in progress in China. It has been impressed upon the authorities in the United States that in some parts of the union the Chinese element is in danger, and precautionary measures are being taken for their protection. In Chicago, for instance, the Mayor and Chief of Police have thought proper to instruct the police to protect the Chinese against any lawless

violence. We notice also that one Sam Moy, a Chinese, has published a letter claiming that his compatriots in America are peaceful, industrious, law-abiding and entitled to fair treatment notwithstanding anything now being done in China. He claims that the Chinese in America "are as much against the Boxers in China as are the Americans or Europeans." He says moreover that many of his fellow-countrymen have become Christians, and these and others would be glad to become citizens if the laws would permit, which they do not.

In this letter there is an obvious undertone of fear of mob violence, such as on the other side the American authorities have apparently anticipated. The apparently simple minded and silent Chinese who walk our streets in seeming blissful unconsciousness of all save their daily work, are still, by some mysterious means aware of what is going on in China, as well as of the new danger which confronts them here in consequence. It is most sincerely to be hoped that no acts of mob violence or hoodlum lawlessness against the Chinese in America may take place. Such a thing would be a disgrace to our religion and civilization alike, and would go so far to make us appear on a par with those in China who are insulting and murdering those whom they call "foreign devils" there. It should be regarded as a test of our civilization and manhood in the present crisis to treat the Chinese in our midst with justice, humanity and kindness.

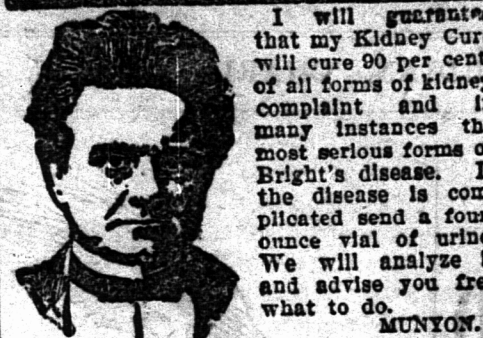
