AN ISLAND MINISTER.—The last issue of the Christian Guardian, the Canadian organ of the Methodist Church contains interesting biographies of the Presidents of the Conference 1920-21. —Mr. Chown was born at Highfield, Prince Edward Island, and was educated in the common school and at Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown, P. E. I., obtaining license to teach school. He taught three years in P. E. I.; entered Mt. Allison University in 1894; graduated, B. A. 1898, and was ordained in St. Stephen, 1899. He was elected Journal Secretary of Conference in 1909 and 1910; elected Secretary of Conference in 1911-12-13-14-15, and in 1916, but declined to accept the honor of office. He was elected delegate to General Conference in 1914. He served the Church as financial secretary of district for ten years. Mr. Chown was married in 1899 by the late Rev. Howard Sprague, D. D., to Miss Ursula J. Distant, youngest daughter of the late James Distant, Esq., of Sackville, N. B. He has a family of four—two boys and two girls. Mr. Chown has always done good and faithful work throughout his ministry, and he has a host of well-wishers in his new and responsible position.

PLANT PATHOLOGIST WANTED.—The Civil Service Commission of Canada give public notice in the Canada Gazette that applications will be received from persons qualified to fill the position of Plant Pathologist at an initial salary of \$2,040 per annum, which will be increased upon recommendation for efficient service at the rate of \$120 per annum, until a minimum of \$2,640 has been reached. This initial salary will be supplemented by whatever bonus provided by law. A list of eligibles will be established for vacancies in the above class throughout the Dominion but the only vacancy required to be filled at present is that of Plant Pathologist in Agriculture, Department of Agriculture, at Charlottetown. For this position, preference will be given to residents of the Province of Prince Edward Island, but persons qualified are urged to take part in this competition in order to become eligible for future vacancies.

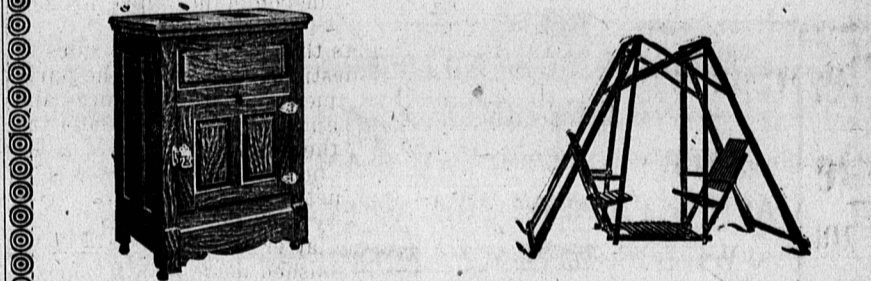
