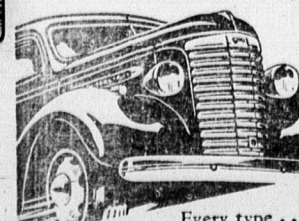

WHY DOES IT THUNDER?
Thunder is an irregular wave in the air. Its cause is the very sudden heating of the air, high up above our heads, by the quick passage of electricity through it from cloud to cloud, or from a cloud to earth. Air offers great resistance to the passage of electricity through it, and when anything resists the passage of electricity that thing becomes hot. If it becomes hot it expands suddenly and recoils, thus setting up the air-wave we call thunder.

A sound spreads out, if it can, equally in every direction; so the sound of the thunder spreads outward from the clouds, downwards through the air, and sideways through the air and through the clouds themselves. The part we hear is, of course, only the part which happens to reach our ears, part of the wave that spreads downward from the place where the electricity passed and started.

WHEN WAGES GO FOR LIQUOR

The Nova Scotia Liquor Commission has recently been asked by the Digby Board of Trade in that province to determine what steps can be taken to prohibit the sale of liquor to certain wage earners of the town. This is not a question of habitual drunkards but of those who are in the habit of spending from a dollar a day upwards at the Liquor Store. Their families are neglected and legitimate accounts due local stores go unpaid.

It was pointed out that a number of men, who are habitual drunkards, are leaving a large portion of their wages in the Liquor Store, with the result their families are poorly fed and clothed and credit cannot collect their bills.

An item appeared in the National Voice recently—"Cocaine and Alcohol"—A physician of great wit is reported to have said, "Beverage alcohol gives you a red nose, a black eye, a white liver, a brown breath, and a blue outlook." But who wants this color scheme in his life?

MILK BARS

The Australian Temperance Council has offered to equip milk and fruit juice bars in military camps at an estimated total cost of 10,000 pounds (about \$50,000). All profits from these bars will be retained within the camp and be used for soldiers' comforts and welfare. The offer has been accepted by the Defence Department, and after the war the equipment will be returned. Every major camp will have some form of milk or fruit juice bar.

Canteen officers said at Brisbane that the average daily consumption is more than 1,000 bottles. The morning supply almost invariably is sold out before the afternoon bottles arrive.

One night only three bottles remained out of more than 1,000. Pineapple juice is popular also. Every available tin in Brisbane has been bought for the canteen.

The Waldorf Astoria in New York City, has recently installed a milk bar as a special attraction. At the entrance to the dining room, in this hotel, "swinging music enthusiasts" step up to a colorful "bar" in evening dress and order Grade A milk, prune juice, lemonade or sarsaparilla.

The idea for the bar was derived from the milk bars in use at many of the prominent debutante parties in the city.

The menu, decorated with the head of a jovial looking cow, lists a wide variety of milk drinks, sodas and soft drinks. The non-alcoholic drinkers are able to enjoy the attractive effects which shining mahogany, wide mirrors and a scintillating chandelier lend to the scene, which is already proving to be one of the interesting "night spots."

England has been having a rapid increase in the number of what it calls milk bars. These institutions sell milk, milkshakes, ice cream, and other concoctions with a milk background. The development has been encouraged by the milk marketing board.

The expansion of milk service led the Manchester Guardian to conduct a competition recently for the writing of a drinking song suitable for singing at milk bars. A verse of the prize winner reads:

"Here's to the Jersey so dainty and slight,

U. S. NAVAL AIR PROGRAMS UNDER STUDY

WASHINGTON, May 9 (AP)—An extraordinary study of the United States navy's shipbuilding and aviation programs, with a view to making the United States "dominant" in warships and seaplanes, was announced tonight by chairman Carl Vinson of the House of Representatives naval committee.

Vinson disclosed that his committee would begin the special inquiry next week to determine whether navy yards and private industry had been making progress "commensurate with the appropriations of Congress."

Although Congress had not "stipulated one dollar" had been requested, the Georgian Democrat said, there were indications that the shipbuilding program was not going ahead as it should. For instance, he declared, work on the new aircraft carrier Wasp was one year behind schedule.

The move to review the operation of present building programs coincided with the progress of legislation authorizing an additional 11-per cent expansion of the fleet at an estimated cost of \$655,000,000.

Unanimously, the senate naval committee recommended that the senate pass the House-approved bill authorizing the construction of 19 battleships and 21 auxiliaries.

Recognizing the possibility that developments in the war may dictate drastic changes in the design of fighting ships, the senate committee rejected, 5 to 3, a proposal to make the new ships a permanent addition to the fleet—a proposal that would permit the navy to replace them without further permission from Congress.

Chairman David Walsh said a majority felt improvement might be so marked in the next few years that the navy ought to consult Congress again before it replaced any of the ships.

On the other hand, committee members voted to give the navy a freer rein in shifting about the 160,000 tons of tonnage now in legislation contemplated under the measure so that it could build larger and more heavily-armed plane carriers and cruisers.

A limitation of 33,400 tons was placed on such shifts, instead of the 16,700-ton limit voted by the House.

12 Witnesses Testify At Murder Trial

WINDSOR, N. S., May 9 (CP)—Twelve witnesses were heard today as the trial of Gilmore Conley, charged with murder of Eldon S. Millet of Pembroke, N. S., opened in Supreme Court. Tabbutt Conley, brother of the defendant, the Hants County farm youth awaits trial on a similar charge.

Most of the evidence today centered around the movements of the brothers on Dec. 28, the night the elderly store-keeper suffered fatal wounds.

Wilson Allen, a merchant of New Summerville, said Millet always kept a roll of bills of small denomination in his pocket.

Arleigh Wilcox testified he had seen the brother who had later identified as the brothers walking toward Pembroke the night of Dec. 28.

He said he saw them when the lights from a truck lit up the road. Allen, the driver of the truck, was unable to identify the men.

Relatives of the brothers testified the two were at a hockey game at Walton the night of the assault. LeRoy Conley, a nephew, said they had left the rink returning around 10 o'clock.

The trial will continue tomorrow.
