

 factory where the practical working was explained by the chairman, Mr. Mitchell, who has had considerable to do with the organization of the creamery business, and the manager, Mr. J. P. Simmons.  
 After this a vote of thanks was, on the motion of Mr Charles Way, St. Peters, tendered to the directors for the delightful entertainment given and the valuable information imparted.  
 Mr. Solomon Rapson, of Midgell, replied, and by special request Mr. Andrew McRae gave some personal experience of the working of a dairy farm, especially with regard to the feeding and freshening of dairy cows. He recommended that cows should not be freshened before three years old, and if possible, in the fall. It was better to have one fall calf than three spring calves. The calves should be fed three times a day on milk for three weeks, then put on grain and skimmed milk. At one month, they should be fed on bran, in addition, and then, by stages, on hay and turnips. In three years they would have a magnificent cow and if this process was followed each generation would improve in size and productivity till in four generations they would have animals that should produce the maximum quantity of milk. He could say that with authority, as he had himself proved it.  
 At the close a vote of thanks was given to the speakers on the motion of Dr Guathier and the proceedings concluded with the singing of the National Anthem.  
 During the afternoon the ladies served ice cream to the visitors, and music was supplied by Mr McQueen on the bagpipes.  
 Dunstaffnage Creamery is one of the most modern and up-to-date plants in the Island. It is situated about a mile and a half from Bedford and Suffolk stations and has over 300 patrons at present. The cream is received at a platform and weighed and sampled on entry. Composite samples are tested twice a month for butter fat. The cream is passed from the scales to the vats, where it is cooled and ripened. Next it is passed to the churns by means of an automatic filler, the churn being one of the most modern, with a capacity of 600 lbs. per churning. The butter is never taken out of the churn till it is ready to be printed, the combination enabling the butter maker to work, wash salt and make ready for printing and packing in one process. It is subsequently removed to cold-storage rooms, where it is retained for shipping. The creamery turns out about 1,100 lbs. per day six days a week, last year the output being 100,000 lbs.

**RUSSIA BUYS THE STEAMER BRUCE**

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., July 10.—The purchase by the Russian Government of ice-breaking steamer Bruce from the Reid Newfoundland Company was announced to-day. It is understood that the Bruce, with her sister ship, Lintrose, bought by Russia last winter in an effort to keep open later than usual the channel to the port of Archangel.

The Bruce and the Lintrose were built a few years ago for service in Cabot Strait, between Newfoundland and Cape Breton, where heavy ice is encountered in the winter. They are steamers of 1,553 tons.

**RUSSIANS CAPTURED 53,000 GERMAN PRISONERS**

LONDON, July 10.—The Times correspondent with the Russian forces on the Zlota Lipa River, Galicia, says he learns that the Russian flanking armies are not retreating through local necessities, but owing to the situation in the centre, where concentrations of Germans continue to be directed.

"From information gleaned from high resources," says the despatch, "I believe that the extreme left of this army would not have been obliged to retire had it been acting independently. The retreat of this army was one of the most remarkable rearguard actions recorded in military history, for though faced by overwhelming forces of the enemy, it retired with no loss of morale and in six weeks has withdrawn from the Stry River to the Zlota Lipa and has taken 53,000 prisoners, besides inflicting a loss on the enemy probably greater in casualties."

"All the officers here agree that the Zlota Lipa River is such a strong natural barrier that it could have been held indefinitely, if this army's movements were independent. It is futile to speculate how much further the enemy will retire, but before the Tarnopol is reached there are at least six natural positions, and it will cost the Austrians three to four fold loss."

**MINNEHAHA ARRIVES IN HALIFAX**  
 (Special to the Guardian.)  
 HALIFAX, July 11.—The Minnehaha sailed this afternoon. The fire in the cargo was completely extinguished. The Port Warden's examination found no bombs on board. Fifty tons of cargo were removed and left behind.

**HALIFAX, July 11.**—The Minnehaha arrived Friday morning. A terrific explosion, evidently from an infernal machine mysteriously placed in compartment No. 3, which shook the ship from stem to stern, occurred on the liner last Wednesday afternoon. The explosion occurred shortly after four o'clock. The steamer was then on her way from New York to the other side and carried a heavy cargo, largely made up of munitions of war. So terrific was the explosion that three men were thrown into the air and were dazed for some minutes afterwards.

Whether the explosion was the work of Frank Holt, the would-be assassin of J. P. Morgan, Captain Claret could not say. He was non-committal regarding the cause of the explosion.
