I hope for a lasting peace and I am indeed happy to have you as my friend. Good bye (signed), Eiko Ono.

WEED CONTROL ASSISTANCE. Farm producers are hereby advised that the Provincial Department of Agriculture will render assistance in the purchase of 2-4-D for the control of Wild Radish, Mustard, and other obnoxious weeds, on the following basis: Fifty per cent of the cost of either powder or liquid 2-4-D, but not to exceed fifty cents per pound for powder or five dollars per gallon for liquid. Payment will be made direct to the farm purchaser on presentation of a fully signed and receipted statement from the dealer or seller covering quantities purchased and the cost of the material.
