Sealed Tenders will be received by the undersigned until January 11th, 1905, for the conveyance of school children to the Methodist C. M. School at Hillside (Mount Herbert) every day the school is in session between the dates May 1st, 1905 and Dec 31st, 1905, inclusive.

Route No. 1. Hazelbrook ex. from the late Michael McDonald's along the Lot 43 Road via McKenzie's, corner of the school, to the school.

Route No. 2. From the school by nearest road to school.

Route No. 3. From Mermaid by nearest road to school.

Route No. 4. From Sunbury by nearest road to school.

Route No. 5. Extends from Mr. Dan McKee's, Ten Hill, via Cross Roads to Mr. Frank Ferguson's.

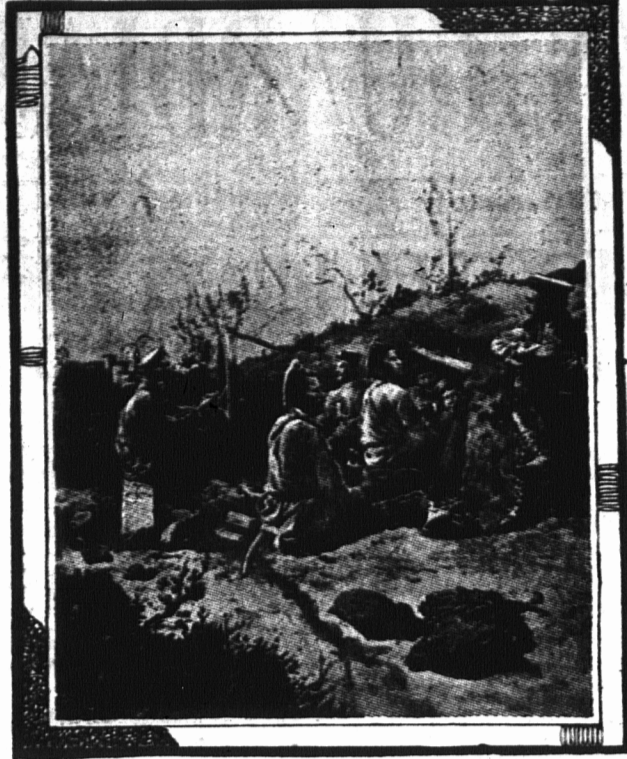
The tender must state cost per day for conveying the pupils to and from the school.

CONDITIONS

1. Drivers will be required to sign a contract.
2. The contractor will be supplied with a van.
3. The contractor must furnish horse or horses, harness and harness.
4. The driver shall wait not longer than two minutes at collecting route for children.
5. Vans will pass along the main road in each district.
6. No pupils over school age shall be conveyed in vans.
7. No children over twelve years of age, who reside within one and a half miles of school shall be conveyed in vans.
8. All other children who reside more than one mile from the school to be conveyed.

TO BE THIRTEEN MORE CANADIAN SENATORS

Government Has in Mind Legislation to Increase Representation of West in Upper House to 24--Seating Plan of Commons Arranged--A Present for Mr. Smart.

OTTAWA, Jan. 5.—It is just probable that legislation will be passed next session giving power to the Dominion government to increase the representation of the west in the Canadian senate to 24. At confederation there were three groups of senators, each group comprised 24. One group for the maritime provinces, one for Quebec and one for Ontario.

The intention now is to make a fourth group of 24 for the Territories west of Lake Superior, which would make 96 senators in all. There are at present 11 senators west of Lake Superior and what is necessary is to get power to increase the number by the appointment of 13 more, making 24.

The government appoint additional senators for the Northwest Territories, but the sanction of the imperial parliament will be necessary before the number in Manitoba and British Columbia can be increased. While power would be obtained to make the increase of 13, the appointments would be made only in accordance with the increase in the populations.

The senate of the new House of Commons has at last been arranged. The Liberals will occupy all the seats to the right of the speaker, and 32 to the left. Mr. Fielding will take Sir Richard Cartwright's seat; Mr. Fitzpatrick, Mr. Fielding, and Mr. Lemieux. Mr. Fitzpatrick Hon. Thomas Greenway will have a front seat with Mr. Belcourt as desk mate.

James A. Smart, deputy minister of the interior, was the recipient, yesterday afternoon of a cabinet of silver from the staff of the department. The presentation was made by Mr. Beddoe, the accountant who read an address which referred to his high esteem in which Mr. Smart was held by all the employees.

Mr. Smart spoke of the loyal support which he had received from the staff in carrying on the work of the department, and added that it was his intention to go into private business.

Mr. Cory will take up the duties of the deputy minister tomorrow.

The customs receipts show a recovery from the slight check business suffered during the autumn. The collections for December were \$3,300,084, an increase of \$259,825 over December, 1903. For the six months ended Dec. 31 the collections were \$21,204,117, an increase of \$550,356 over the same period of 1903.

TO PUSH WORK OF THE Y.M.C.A.

Field Secretary Appointed to Organize Throughout Western Canada.

About a year ago a movement was inaugurated to organize and advance the work of the Y. M. C. A. throughout western Canada, and a provisional committee was appointed. Recently this movement took a practical and permanent form when the provisional committee and co-workers met and organized the Canadian West committee of the Y. M. C. A. which will have an executive control and will exercise a general supervision of the territory from Winnipeg to the Pacific coast. The members of this committee are: Dr. Hutchinson, chairman; R. R. Wilson, vice-chairman; Dr. C. H. Wale, secretary; D. A. Mott, W. H. Hutchinson, G. F. Stephens, David Horne, Robert Muir, I. W. Martin, T. Gordon Russel, W. F. Hart, all of Winnipeg; W. O. Hunt, Calgary; Dr. G. Polard, Regina; A. McKenzie (London); H. H. Smith, Edmonton; and Principal J. H. Riddell, Edmonton.

Mr. Geo. Irving was appointed travelling secretary to effectively put into operation the objects of the organization.

Mr. W. M. Parson, one of the traveling secretaries of United States, was present at the meeting and assisted at the organization.

Mr. Irving went west in September on the advice of his doctor. After resting two months he has made his health such that he can consent part time work for the organization. After a year's absence in the west it is hoped he will be sufficiently restored in health to permit his taking up work in India as secretary of the Y. M. C. A.
