PRICE OF HAY - The maximum price for timothy hay may be sold is fixed now at \$3 per ton above that for other kinds of hay. As timothy is used mainly for horse feed the increase in the ceiling price will not affect the cost of production of dairy products. Another change permits producers who sell direct to feeders to add to their selling price the mark-ups to which dealers are entitled. This amounts to \$1.50 per ton for hay loaded and shipped in carload lots, \$2.50 per ton for smaller quantities.

Hot Debate At Banking Committee

OTTAWA, July 6-(CP) - The Commons banking committee, where monetary theories and policies have been discussed at length in 30 sessions, flared into angry debate today as six members followed Hon. G. G. McCleer (Lancaster, York-Sunbury) in protest against what they called endless repetition. G. G. McCleer (Lancaster, York-Sunbury), who at the time was questioning Dr. W.C. Clark, deputy finance minister, answered that unless "Tory interference" with his questioning was halted the committee would continue its work "until Christmas".

Clark, in his examination of Dr. Clark, Mr. McCleer said that recent Canadian votes had indicated that the condition with respect to the public mind was "more serious than many of us would like to see. No government could do without the support of a majority."

Mr. McCleer said that national income in 1939 to \$5,000,000,000 in 1943 and still there was no condition of uncontrollable inflation. Dr. Clark: "But we had to do many things to prevent inflation."

Mr. McCleer said that the success of these controls was due to the operation of the people, supported by Robert Ryan (L—Three Rivers), J.H. J.J. Kinley (L—Queens-Lanenburg) said that even people of the party, who are not members of the committee, should be given the opportunity to discuss the bill, clause by clause. He said he felt the committee had failed in its duty in not dealing with the bill itself.

Finance Minister Ilsey said he was "discouraged" by the slow progress made in dealing with the bill. He could not control the committee. Mr. McCleer said the committee was a free one, and Mr. Ilsey was not supposed to control it. Mr. Kinley said that he did not like the implication by Mr. McCleer which was incorrect as he was never a member of the committee. He was simply asking that it proceed to deal with the bill itself. The committee will hear a delegation from the united farmers of Canada, Saskatchewan and Alberta, which will discuss aspects of the bill.

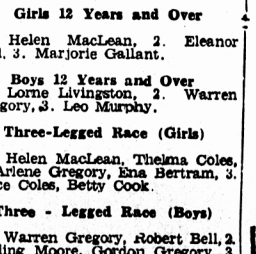
