AMERICAN NOTE COMMENTED ON

(Special to the Guardian.)

BERLIN, June 12.—via Amsterdam.—Although well received in official quarters, the American note has called for some sharp comment from the newspapers.

The Kolnische Volks Zeitung says: "Without doubt Mr. Lansing, in comparison with Mr. Bryan is a man of very sharp tone, but the German press will do well not to inquire too anxiously whether he is a man of sharp or of peaceful tone."

"Our submarine warfare will not cease on that account. If American ships or Americans in British ships enter the war zone they must, despite Mr. Lansing and President Wilson take the risk involved in such a voyage. Americans can claim the right to judge neutrals' rights only when she herself maintains neutrality. Such was not the case under the pacifists Mr. Bryan, and probably will be just as little the case under the international law except, Mr. Lansinging."

NO ANSWER FOR TWO WEEKS.

The Vossische Zeitung says: "The note probably will not be answered sooner than two weeks, because the arrival of Dr. Meyer Gerhardt with special messages from Count Von Bernstorff, the German ambassador at Washington, to the German government must be awaited. His arrival is not expected before the 17th and the answer cannot be prepared until after this."

The note has been well received in official quarters.

NATIONALISTS ARE AGAIN AT PEACE.

LONDON, June 12.—The differences between the Nationalists Party and the Cabinet concerning the appointment of law officers for Ireland have been settled by permitting Ignatius O'Brien to retain the Irish Lord Chancellorship, instead of that office being given to the Rt. Hon. James H. M. Campbell, and by making John Gordon, Unionist member of Parliament for Londonderry attorney-general.

Mr. Gordon, although an anti-Home Ruler, is not so pronounced an Ulsterite as Mr. Campbell. The Nationalists agreed to accept him for the sake of the elimination of Mr. Campbell.

At a Nationalists meeting held today, and over which John Redmond the party's leader, was presiding, resolutions were passed expressing satisfaction that the protests of the party the Lord Chancellorship being handed over to a Unionist, and especially a Unionist with the record of Mr. Campbell.

The resolutions agree that the extraordinary dangers of the present crisis, from taking any hostile action against the new Government in connection with the appointment of a Unionist to the attorney-generalship of Ireland. They express the conviction that nothing has occurred in any way of jeopardise "the certain operation at the conclusion of the war, provided always that meantime the people protest and keep the national organization and preserves the essential unity of the country."

TWO AEROPLANES ARE CAPTURED

NISH, Serbia, June 13.—Three Austrian Aeroplanes Friday dropped bombs on Kragojevatz killing or wounding twelve. Serbian aeroplanes pursued them bringing one down. Another with two German officers was captured at Agripalanka.

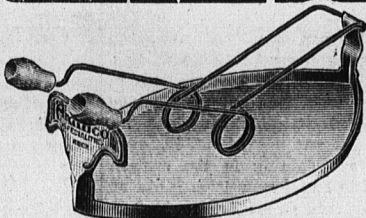

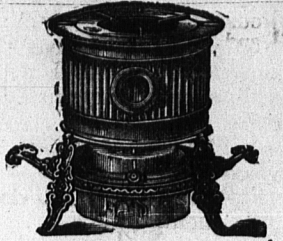
