### N. B. Village Is Scene Of Tragedy

LEFANG, N. B., Feb. 5.—(CP)—Two residents of this Charlottetown County fishing village drowned in Haiti's Cave today. Bodies of the victims, Ody Steen, 27, and his brother, Albert, 18, were recovered. There were no witnesses of the tragedy. The young men left home this morning to pump out their motor boat, anchored off shore. They set out in a dinghy, which apparently began to leak badly. It was believed that Albert, an expert swimmer, left the sinking boat and struck out for a nearby

Island, leaving the craft lighter for his brother, who was unable to swim.

Presumably Albert was seized with cramps in the cold water. The body of Ody was found in the water-filled dinghy, which drifted back to shore. His death was pronounced due to exposure.

The body of Albert was found on the beach after the tide went out.
