## Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

The sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.  
Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.  
In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.  
Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.  
A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

## IMPERIAL PREFERENCE ISSUE REALLY SETTLED IN ADVANCE

LONDON, Tuesday, Feb. 20.—The Times' Parliamentary correspondent writes: "The announcement of Lord Balfour's Committee on After the War Trade Policy, holding declaring by an unanimous vote for an Imperial preference, caused considerable stir in the lobby. The hope was generally expressed that the interim report embodying the recommendation would be made public at once, and that the Government would announce its decision without delay. There is a great deal to be done before such a sweeping recommendation can be translated into action, and it is felt there is no time to be lost. If our economic machinery is to be in good order on the coming of peace, if the Government accept the Imperial preference as a basis for reconstruction of our economic fabric they may be expected to carry the bulk of the Liberal opposition. Public opinion and the pressure of events have really settle the issue in advance."

## INDIA TO PASS CONSCRIPTION ACT

DELHI, Feb. 10.—Lord Chelmsford, the Viceroy, presiding over the Imperial Legislative Council, said that the Governments activities were being concentrated upon how best to assist the Empire to achieve victory. India must be ready to place all resources at the disposal of the Empire. He did not wish to minimize the efforts already made, but for the future the motto must be, "Effort and yet greater effort."  
Referring to the question of abolishing the system of emigration of indentured labor, the Viceroy emphatically declared that neither the Indian Government nor the Secretary of State for India would depart from the pledges already given by Lord Hardinge; but the whole question of abolition required much enquiry to guard against a bad system being succeeded by a worse one. The Government intended that a conference consisting of representatives of Indian and colonial interests should meet in London about May next to formulate a scheme which would be acceptable to both parties. The Colonial Office had wholeheartedly accepted the decision that in its present form emigration must cease and the colonies concerned were showing the utmost readiness to co-operate and remove the objectionable features of the present system.  
The Indian Government, he said, intended to consider the question of the increased employment of Indians in the higher branches of the public service. Regarding the general question of political reform, the Indian Government had addressed the Secretary of State for India last Autumn, but owing to the Cabinet's attention being now entirely occupied by the war a speedy reply to this despatch could not be expected.  
All Males to Register  
Referring to the recent ordinance requiring all males in India between the ages of 18 and 50 to register, the viceroy stated that the time had now arrived for India to release for service in the field British units which otherwise would be employed on garrison duty. The necessities of war made it imperative to organize an Indian defence force. It was there proposed to introduce a bill whereby all European British subjects between the ages of 18 and 41 would be liable to general military service in India. Those between the ages of 41 and 50 would be compulsorily enrolled for local military service and youths between the ages of 16 and 18 would be enrolled for military training. The Government also proposed enrolling Indians in their own units for general military service in India for the duration of the war.  
Lord Chelmsford paid high tribute to Indian's frontier officers and her naval, militia and criminal intelligence officers who had brought to naught all schemes against India's security. His Excellency suggested that the political importance of the Mesopotamian campaign would be better known in future, Persia had maintained a benevolent neutrality.

Ledwell, and Miss Agnes Fitzgerald, the Ladies Auxiliary Committee.  
The meeting was for the purpose of receiving the report of the Ladies Committee after a personal visitation by them of the beneficiaries of the Fund receiving aid in this city.
