First recruits for Women's Corps
 OTTAWA, Oct. 12 —(CP)—The first ministry announced tonight that the first 150 women recruits in the Canadian Women's Auxiliary Air Force are being notified to report at the nearest Royal Canadian Air Force recruiting centre for enlistment.
 "These 150 women, the first recruits to this service, have been selected by two travelling selection boards which concluded their tour on Tuesday," the announcement said.
 Simultaneously the ministry announced that Princess Alice has accepted appointment as honorary air commandant in the C. W. A. A. F.—"Practical evidence of her interest in this new Canadian women's service."
 The first 150 women called for enlistment will be the nucleus of the C. W. A. A. F. in which recruiting later will be extended to a rate of 150 a week, the announcement said.
 After enlistment the recruits will attend the first course of instruction which opens at the C.W.A.A.F. training depot in Toronto Oct. 23.
 "Termed administrative trainees," these recruits will be representative of the whole of Canada," tonight's announcement said. "Selected for administrative experience and capacity for leadership, they will be the source from which the first officers and non-commissioned officers of this new service will be drawn."
 "They will receive five weeks of instruction from officers of the R. C.A.F. and from experienced women's auxiliary air force officers sent to Canada from Britain for this purpose."

Describes meeting With Soviet Head
 NEW YORK, Oct. 12 —(AP)—Vernon Bartlett, veteran British foreign correspondent and now a member of Parliament, tonight described in a broadcast the Anglo-American-Russian dinner in the Kremlin which he attended as a member of the British supply mission.
 NBC, which picked up the broadcast, quoted Mr. Bartlett as saying:
 "My outstanding impression of Mr. Stalin is that he differs amazingly from the popular conception we have all had of the man in previous years. I shall never forget watching him while attending a moving picture performance in the Kremlin in the company of his guests following the dinner.
 Throughout the performance he sat smiling benignly at the films that were offered, utterly unperturbed by the booming of the anti-aircraft guns that reached us through the walls of the Kremlin."
 Mr. Bartlett said that the work of the conference was facilitated by the fact that "Lord Beaverbrook made an immense impression on Mr. Stalin, who greatly admired Beaverbrook's forthright manner and wisdom of decision."
 He said that the conferees agreed that creation of a military division to aid Russia "offered great difficulties" and the sending of supplies to the Soviet forces became the important issue at the parley.

Passenger Tells Of Ship Sinking
 Arrive in Lisbon after all-night battle with sea in open lifeboat.
 (Charles Buffinger, 26, of Beverly Hills, California, was a passenger on the 2,044-ton Portuguese steamship Corde Real, which was sunk by a German submarine Sunday with two Portuguese women and their children and the only other passenger, a Frenchman, and the crew of 36 he arrived in Lisbon last night by trawler after an all-night fight against the sea in a leaky lifeboat. He tells the story of his adventure exclusively in the following article.)

Sub Appears
 LISBON, Oct. 14 —(AP)—We left Oporto (Portugal) about 5 o'clock Saturday afternoon with five other passengers, myself and the crew.
 About 10 o'clock Sunday morning a four-motored bomber marked with a swastika swept so close to the ship we thought it would hit the mast and we feared it was going to dive bomb us. We could see bombs in the rack, and believe me, when they are above you they give you the jitters.
 About 11:30 we saw a plane over us, signalling with flashes, apparently from a sun reflector, but observed nothing at sea. I went into the cabin and was watching a steward lay places for lunch when we heard two shots. I rushed on deck and saw a submarine lying on the surface about three city blocks from us.
 The second officer and several members of the crew lowered a lifeboat and rowed over to the sub. They were there about half an hour, talking with the Germans on the conning tower while the sub cruised slowly around us. Then the officer came back and conferred with the captain, who also went over to the submarine.
 Later the Captain told us he had offered to discharge his cargo or return to Oporto or go to Lisbon but the Germans were adamant.
 He returned in a few minutes and told us bluntly to get into the lifeboats. He said the ship would be sunk immediately.
 Six or seven German sailors came aboard, with submachine guns, and hurried us into lifeboats.
 As the three lifeboats rowed away from the ship one of them settled so much that the women and children were taken onto the submarine and the other survivors were distributed in our remaining two boats alongside the sub.
 German sailors brought us cotton to stuff our ears and the submarine's crew fired nine shots. Part of the boat was set afire but it remained afloat. The submarine finally sank it with a torpedo which caused a tremendous explosion.

New warplane Built like seagull
 WASHINGTON, Oct. 12 —(AP)—United States army air force officials were reported authoritative today to be keenly interested in a new "flying wing" radically different from current airplanes and believed to hold the promise of revolutionizing aircraft design.
 The plane, under test in California, lacks both fuselage and tail and is literally a "flying wing." Brief information on it, including a sketch, was disclosed by a patent office publication, but officials said details had been classified as confidential and placed in the secret patent files.
 The craft is propelled by two flat pusher-type engines which are built into the wings.
 Movable tips of the wings serve as rudder and ailerons. The cabin is in the centre, and a gun turret has been placed atop each wing. In appearance, it resembles a seagull.
 Aviation designers have been working for two decades or more on tailless planes which, in theory, should be capable of much higher speeds and greater manoeuvrability than conventional craft.
 This first strictly all-wing machine is known as the Northrop Flying Wing after its designer, John K. Northrop, of Hawthorne, Calif. The test machine already has flown more than 100 hours. Northrop is
