The framework is now in course of construction by Lowe Bros. and the door itself which has arrived will be put in place in a few days.

Owing to the fog of yesterday it was impossible to see the Stanley from the shore but as it was a calm day it is probable she is still located where she was on Tuesday about six miles off the shore to the south east of De Sable. It is proposed to use dynamite to release her from the ice and as the only dynamite on the island is owned by the Bridge works a telegram has been sent to Montreal asking leave to use some. Milton Welsh who visited the Stanley on Tuesday reports her firmly fastened in the ice in about 6 or 7 fathoms of water.
